Y. M. C. A. CAMP PLANNING TRIP

Mahn-go-tah-see Boys Will Go 150 Miles Up Au Sable River

As the final three weeks of the summer period begin at Camp Mahn-go-tah-see, Oakland County Y. M. C. A. camp, many special events are being planned by Robert D. Lynd, director. The outstanding activity this week was the third canoe trip on the Au Sable River. The group traveled more than 150 miles through country described as wild and picturesque, and sighted deer in abundance and bears occasionally. The final canoe trip, to start Aug. 20, has been opened to the fathers of the boys in camp and other fathers and sons who may register for the trip. Some time will be spent in camp by the fathers and their sons, and on the trip they will sleep and cook in the open. Another coming event will take the campers 150 miles by automobile to Camp Spier, northern camp of Selfridge Field flyers. Included on this trip will be a visit to Indian camp meeting grounds and two nights on Lake Huron. The Hopi Snake dance, a recent dramatic presentation of the Indian religious site, was accorded a great deal of interest. Those present were particularly enthusiastic during the part of the dance in which those taking part held snakes in their mouths. The boys also presented a country circus which was judged to be very successful. The last camp period, which opens Saturday, Aug. 11, still has accommodations for a few more boys, according to Mr. Lynd.

Veterans' Widows Get Compensation

Compensation for widows and children of World War veterans for death not due to service has been provided for in a bill recently signed by President Roosevelt, according to an interpretation recently received at Oakland county Red Cross headquarters. The two most important items in the new bill are as follows: 1) Compensation is provided for widows and children of World War veterans who served before Nov. 12, 1918 (or before April 2, 1920, in Russia) if the veteran died while receiving or entitled to receive compensation, pension, or retirement pay for a 30 per cent or greater disability directly incurred or aggravated in World War service. Cause of death is immaterial. 2) Existence of the directly service connected disease or injury must have been established to the satisfaction of the Veterans' Administration prior to the date of the veteran's death, but determination of 30 per cent disability, resulting from such disease or injury, may be based on medical records after the veteran's death, within three years from the date of death or from June 23, 1934, whichever is the later date. Complete information may be obtained at Red Cross headquarters in Pontiac.

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COMPLETE ADAMS SEWER Digging of the Adams sewer has been completed and most of the backfill work done. At present the machine has been moved to the site of the Wilder Woodward project where a 1,200 foot sewer will be dug in anticipation of the completion of the widening at some time soon.
