**RALLY AT 9TH
BEATS B. A. C.**

Detroiters Score Three Runs
In Last Inning To Win
By 6 to 4

A ninth-inning rally in which the opposition scored three runs turned victory into defeat for the Birmingham Athletic Club baseball nine in a game with the Detroit Monarchs on the East Maple avenue diamond here Sunday afternoon. The final count was 6 to 4.

The B. A. C. fell to pieces defensively after going into the ninth with a lead, and three errors, combined with two doubles ranged up in succession by Pollock and Price of the visiting delegation in the first half of that frame gave the Monarchs more than enough runs to win.

It was a hard game for Cliff Kelly, the Birmingham moundman, to lose. Although he allowed 11 bingles in the nine innings, he gave no more than two in any one frame, and fanned 11 of the Detroit batsmen. Schwartz, Detroit's pitcher, granted but nine hits and chalked up 10 strikeouts, but he was worked for five passes.

Both teams scored once in the first and again in the fourth, but the B. A. C. took the lead in the sixth on a run made possible through two walks and two infield outs.

The Monarchs tied it up in the eighth when Eganand was safe on an error, stole second, and scored on a single by Art, but Birmingham got that one right back in the half of the same inning, which Jewell opened with a single to right. Kiley tripled in the same direction, but was later caught off third base, and Jewell's score was the last until the Monarch's came to bat in the fatal ninth.

The B. A. C. is scheduled to tackle the Warren Harvesters in a return game on the local diamond at 3 P. M. this Sunday. Birmingham defeated the Harvesters, 9 to 7, when the two teams met early last month at Warren.

**THREE CANDIDATES
DROP OUT OF RACE**

Lee Allen, MacIntosh Quit Campaign For County Clerk; Yerkes Withdraws

Two candidates for Oakland County clerk, and one candidate for congressman from the 17th district, for all of whom petitions had been filed for the September primaries, withdrew their names last week-end, leaving the field clear for their opponents.

The candidates to drop out of the race for clerk were Lee D. Allen, Republican, and Frank R. MacIntosh, Democrat, both of Pontiac. Allen said he was withdrawing because of the fact that his name was so similar to that of Lynn D. Allen, present holder of the office and a candidate for re-election, that his motives in running might be misconstrued, and that he wished to avoid misunderstanding.

Withdrawal of Lee Allen and MacIntosh leaves the field open to two Republican candidates and three Democrats. The Republicans are Lynn Allen and Maurice G. Reeves, Pontiac; and the Democrats are Vincent E. Boyle, Milford; Emmet Corrigan, Royal Oak, and John D. McGillis, Ferndale.

The congressional candidate to withdraw was Robert G. Yerkes of Northville, who ran unsuccessfully for the office on the Republican ticket two years ago. His withdrawal leaves the race for the G. O. P. nomination open to George A. Dondero, Royal Oak, and John Fox Morris, both of Detroit, and Morris R. Hubbard and Charles P. Webster, both of Pontiac.

YOUTH 17, TO HEAR SENTENCE SATURDAY

Arthur Marotz, 17 years old, of 544 Mack street, Pontiac, is scheduled to be sentenced by Circuit Judge Frank C. Covert Saturday morning on a charge of attempted larceny from a Birmingham store.

Marotz pleaded guilty last Saturday to an unsuccessful attempt to take money from a cash drawer in the Goodyear Service Station here several weeks ago. His arraignment had been postponed for a sanity hearing at the request of Detective Earl Moody of the Birmingham police department, but he was declared sane.

The same youth was arrested in Birmingham last October, also on a charge of attempted larceny from a store. At that time he was placed on probation in Juvenile Court.
