of the 17, or of others that may be added later, will be chosen, will be chosen upon the nature of the program, none of the details of which are yet known. Whether the program will be designed to relieve only unemployed subjects, as does the current Work Wage program, or whether it will provide jobs for other unemployed persons, as did the CWA, has not been disclosed.

Topping the Birmingham list is the proposed Rouge River sewage disposal system. An application for federal funds for construction of the system under the PWA program was denied, but officials are hoping the program will be such a nature that at least some part of sewage disposal project will qualify.

Mr. Parry was in Ann Arbor yesterday conferring with Walter Drury, consulting engineer, on four alternative projects under the sewage disposal heading. Mr. Drury was the engineer who drew the plans on which the PWA application was based. The four alternatives, as outlined to the Commission Monday night, are:

1. Construction of filters at the site of the present disposal plant. These filters would be only temporary, and would not be usable if a new plant were constructed at a later date farther down the Rouge.
2. Continuation of the trunk line sewer from the present plant to a point just below the Fourteen Mile road. No filters.

3. Same as No. 2, but with filters.

Continuation of the trunk line to a point down the Rouge at which it is planned the new disposal plant would be erected. The cost of the last alternative, Mr. Parry said, would be essentially the same as that estimated in the PWA application for the system, about \$177,000. Any of the four projects, except the first, would be on a "whenever available" basis, which would mean that the full system when it is eventually completed would be essential.

In addition to the sewage project, Mr. Parry listed the following projects which might qualify under the new relief program:

1. Painting and alterations in the Municipal Building.
2. Continuation of the park improvement project.
3. Construction of a warehouse and equipment on the Grand Truck right-of-way.
4. Painting of fire hydrants.
5. Sewer replacements.
6. Technical survey—segregation of bookkeeping and completion of city maps, etc.
7. Tree trimming and nursery work.
8. Sidewalk repairs.
9. Construction of a warehouse and equipment on the Grand Truck right-of-way.
10. Painting of fire hydrants.
11. Sewer replacements.
12. Sewer replacements.
13. Clearing and beautification of Quanton Lake, providing the city should obtain title to the property.
14. Construction of new catch basin and manholes.
15. Erection of new street name markers.

(b) That the income of the signers of the note is at least five times the annual payments on the note.
(c) That your mortgage, if any, is in good standing, and that there are no other past due encumbrances or liens against your property.
(d) That you will use the proceeds solely for property improvement.
- 6—WHAT SIGNATURES ARE REQUIRED ON THE NOTE?
Signature of the property owner, and (except in special cases) if the owner is an individual and is married, also signature of wife or husband. No other co-signers or endorsers are required.
- 7—HOW DO I PAY THE NOTE?
By making regular, equal, monthly payments (seasonal payments for farmers) until the note is paid in full.
