Degree Rewards Efforts of Girl Who Earned Own Way

When Miss Maud Curry received her Bachelor of Science Degree from the Ypsilanti State Normal College Friday, she won a victory which should bring courage to the hearts of all young people who earnestly desire a college education.

Hers was a victory over obstacles which seemed to obstruct her path to college, when she was graduated from Baldwin High School in 1930. Having conquered, and holding a teacher's life certificate as well as her degree, Miss Curry is eager to assure girls who hesitate to enter college because of financial or other difficulties, that they can "work their way" through and still have ample time for campus and other activities.

Miss Curry is the daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. David H. Curry of Philadelphia, formerly of Birmingham. Four years ago she undertook to earn enough money to finance her own college education, and during the four years she determinedly carried out her resolution. Doing housework for her room and board four hours each day during the college year, and finding other occupations during the summer, she was able to pay her expenses.

As proof that a girl may work and still participate in college activities, Miss Curry found time to sing in the Normal Choir, from which she was chosen to join the membership in the Kappa Delta Pi, National Honorary Society, president of "Students" a student organization, and a member of the American Childhood Education Club. In addition to her college studies, she was a member of the choir and other organizations of the Presbyterian Church.

An accident resulting from a fall last winter, prevented Miss Curry from graduating in June. But she was regarded as just another obstacle to be overcome and she soon completed the work necessary to receive her degree in August.

"Working one's way through college is no easy, and the girl who undertakes it must realize that fact," Miss Curry said, "but it can be done by anyone who has the determination for a college education. An encouraging thing about it is, that everybody is anxious to help and give the student every possible chance to succeed."

Miss Curry will assume her duties as teacher of the first grade in the school at Roseville Mich., in the fall.
