In the past, Maple players have generally been exceptionally accurate shots, but have failed to do much shooting since the 1934-35 season, made twice as many attempts as did the Dearborn five Friday night, but the majority of them failed to find their mark.

## Ergasterion Club Scores Hit In Play Satisfying Royalty

Producing one of the most successful shows in its history, the Ergasterion Club, which presented on Friday and Saturday evenings of last week in the school auditorium, Robert Sherwood's well-known comedy, "The Queen's Husband."

This was the first time in several years that a Cranbrook play had been given at two performances, and the fact that audiences of about 200 on Friday, attended, testifies to its success. The show, which was a fine and exceptional cast, fine scenery and technical work, and excellent direction.

"The Queen's Husband" is a story of a mythical kingdom, called Myria, and is a satire on European royalty. All three acts take place in the King's study, where the author, Queen attempts to rule the country. The King goes his ineffectual way, the Princess romances with the King's secretary, and an informal wedding, a revolution, and intrigue all have their setting.

Cast in the role of Queen Martha the Ergasterion Club arranged every thing from her daughter's marriage to foreign loans, was Wendell Meyer, who played the role of His Majesty, Eric the Eighth, who reluctantly gives up checkers in order to assert his authority, was Bill Hutchinson.

Norman Getzinger, who so ably played Little Mary in "Ten Nights in a Barroom" of last year, portrayed the important role of Princess Anne; James Pickard, another Cranbrook actor of note, took the part of Anne's lover, Frederick Granton, secretary to the King.

One of the best performed parts in the play was Joseph Smith's portrayal of Phipps, stately English baron; while James Talman acted extremely well as Lord Birten. Dorr Lovett made a highly amusing Prince William, contrasting in appearance for the Princess; and Bill Martin was excellent in the role of General Northrup.

Minor parts in the cast were played by Robert Craig as Major Bient; Carl G. Wonnberger as Doctor Felton; William Vawter as Laker, an anarchist; Milbank Pillsbury as a second butler, Pately; and Warner Forsyth and Wiley Hitchcock as the Queen's maids.

The production was directed by Carl Wonnberger, faculty adviser for Ergasterion, and Mrs. W. O. Stevens. Hubert Davis was in charge of technical work, assisted by Waldo Bird, Robert Chandler, John Gilray, John McPherson, Dorr Lovett, Odo Anderson, Rockwood Bullard, Frank Hoffman, and Andrew Hinshaw. Frank Richardson and Mrs. Wonnberger were in charge of make-up.
