Six Teams in B. A. C. League To Compete in 10-Week Schedule

been guilty of boosting their rates in stormy weather.

Strife Cited

"There is doubt that meters will, as Mr. Ross suggests," the city manager said, "redistribute more of the burden on those passengers who take longer trips, but it will also have the effect of increasing the rates for the general public."

Hope was expressed that the regulation and control of rates by the Commission might help to prevent the outbreak of further strife between Reynolds and his competitor, the Star Cab Company, operated by Vern Colburn. According to Mr. Parry, this strife has been a source of complaint for six years.

Federal funds be made for the purpose of reconstructing and enlarging the existing Rouge Valley disposal plant. This plant, as you know, is located adjacent to the Rouge Valley Park and in the midst of a highly developed residential neighborhood.

"The undersigned owners of homes in the vicinity of this disposal plant, have tolerated the continuance of its use upon the understanding that it was only a temporary facility, that it would not be enlarged or extended and that they were now under way to construct a new and more adequate plant in some other location, and that the use of the existing plant would be discontinued and the plant removed in the immediate future. It seems obvious that a plant in this location is highly improper and objectionable for a number of reasons.

"Other Protests Filed

"Many of the undersigned property owners have already filed protests, verbally and in writing, with the village and city and have withheld further insistence upon its discontinuance only because of assurances received from municipal authorities that it would be removed shortly.

"Under these circumstances we seriously object to the expenditure of any funds for the purpose of reconducing or extending the facilities of the present plant, and we earnestly request that the most energetic efforts possible be made by your honorable body and by the city manager to carry out the intent of our ordinance and to prepare a plan for a permanent disposal plant located outside of any residential neighborhood, and for the immediate discontinuance of the existing plant.

We also wish to protest against the use of portions of private property adjacent to the Rouge Valley Park for commercial dumping, and request the enforcement of ordinances prohibiting this practice, if there are such ordinances, and if not, the adoption of suitable ordinances to prevent this practice in the proximity of our public parks and residential neighborhoods.

Congressman George A. Dondro will give his full support in Congress to continuation and completion of the Senate munitions investigation now in progress, he said Monday morning at his office in Royal Oak when he was visited by a delegation of about 40 representatives of men and women's organizations in the 17th district.

The delegation was led by Mr. George T. Hendrie of Bloomfield Hills, former president for Michigan of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, and its visit was part of a nationwide program sponsored by the League for urging senators and representatives to provide sufficient congressional appropriations to insure completion of the munitions inquiry.

Apparently highly pleased by the fact that this was the largest delegation ever to call on him since he became a member of Congress, Mr. Dondro said he believed that elimination of the profits from war would not do anything entirely without international conflict without the additional safeguard of treaties and diplomatic agreements, but said he was sympathetic with any movement which had world peace as its goal.
