PAVILION OPENED TO 300 GUESTS

Dr. Marquis Addressed Large Cranbrook Audience On "The Language of Art"

The new Cranbrook Pavilion, dedicated to the fine arts and to be operated under the direction of the Cranbrook Academy of Art, was formally opened in the presence of about 300 guests at a special ceremony Monday evening.

The Rev. Dr. Samuel S. Marquis spoke on "The Language of Art," after which the guests lingered to view the exhibition of sculpture by Carl Milles and the paintings of Zoltan Zepsey, several of which were shown for the first time. Only a portion of the entire collection of Mr. Milles' sculptural works were exhibited.

The new Pavilion, the interior of which was designed by Eiel Saarinen, Cranbrook resident architect, will be used as a lecture hall for all the Cranbrook institutions under the direction of the Academy.

In addition to the address by Dr. Marquis, the opening ceremonies included piano solos by Fritz Zanotto, well known Detroit pianist. Before the formal opening, the Academy of Art staff entertained 38 guests, including the trustees and heads of the Cranbrook institutions, at dinner at the Art Club.
