SPEAKER WARNS OF DICTATORSHIP
 Says U. S. Must Solve Social, Economic Problems by Voluntary Co-operation
 "Unless the people of the United States want to develop a real dictatorship, they must pledge themselves to greater voluntary co-operative action in the solution of their social and economic problems," declared M. K. Keyworth, superintendent of the Hamtramck public schools, before Birmingham Rotarians Monday noon at the Community House. Mr. Keyworth, a former District Governor for Rotary International in Michigan and western Ontario, is a recognized authority on matters relating to the public schools and their association with political economy. He was introduced by J. B. Hayward, club secretary, who paid glowing tribute to Mr. Keyworth's important contribution to Rotary in this area.
 "Originally, as society became organized under the divine right of kings to rule, the great mass of people performed various tasks, hoping to receive a reward from the monarch," explained Mr. Keyworth. "This reward system has given away, in our times, to the idea of an exchange of services for something; men and women do things, confidently expecting what others will pay for them. A legal tender for the performance of a contract. This system under which we operate today can live only when people, through voluntary action, assume the various duties of modern civilization. Problems that come up in our social and economic planning must be solved through voluntary co-operation, or else involuntary co-operation, otherwise known as dictatorship by government, through dictators and tyrants, must follow."
 Mr. Keyworth used this illustration to point out that the club being a voluntary organization, must be a great school where busy citizens can meet and help one another gather inspiration and knowledge for higher types of service in their respective lines of endeavor.
