MAPLES BEATS VARSITY

Baldwin Grads Set Fast Pace In Winning Cage Tilt By 22-18 Score

The Baldwin High School basketball team was named the first defeat of the season Friday night on the Baldwin court by an alumni five. The varsity players were unable to keep the pace set by the grads, and despite a last quarter rally, found the final count 22 to 18 against them.

The tilt attracted less than 100 fans, one of the smallest crowds that have witnessed a cage contest at Baldwin in recent years.

Despite their lack of practice together, the stars of previous years went the route with apparent ease. They took the lead in the second stanza and did not permit the varsity to top them throughout the remainder of the game. Bob Bunyan (33), Vic Canever (33) and Fred Schwarz (24) were the big guns on the alumni offensive. Schwarz and Canever each accounted for four points, while Bunyan tied with Don Porteous of the varsity for high scoring honors of the game with six points each.

The combination zone and man-to-man defense which the Maples have used with so much success in their previous contests proved to be a small obstacle in the way of an alumni victory. The graduates played a slow, deliberate type of ball, passing several times inside the varsity defense before attempting a shot, and then generally finding the varsity players so out of place that it was impossible for them to block the throw.

The alumni squad was the best that has faced the Maples to date but the varsity was by no means badly off. The Maples fought at every turn, and although led by nine points at the close of the third period, diminished that lead to four points before the game ended.

The Baldwin reserve outfit also lost its game to an alumni second team. Led by Kenny Hunt, the alumni scored 46 points while the varsity reserves were able to account for only 10.

Both of the Baldwin teams will be idle this week, the next playing date being Friday, Jan. 5, with Monroe High School as the opponent. The game will be played on the Baldwin court.
