**CRASH KILLS EX-PRESIDENT**

**Murray A. Ross, 30, Victim Of Auto Tragedy In Seattle, Wash.**

Word has been received here of the death in Seattle, Wash., of Murray A. Ross, formerly of Birmingham, who was killed in an automobile accident Friday, Nov. 29. He was 30 years old.

Mr. Ross was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred S. Ross, of 504 Willis street, Birmingham. He was born in Detroit, but was brought to Birmingham when he was 11 years old, and attended grade school and Baldwin High School here. He had made his home in Seattle for the past five years.

Mr. Ross was a sailor, and had shipped on freighters in the Great Lakes as well as in the Pacific.

Surviving, besides his parents, are his widow, Esther Queen Ross, a three-year-old son, Murray D., a sister, Margaret E. Ross of Birmingham, and a brother, Warren D. Ross of Huston, Tex.

Mrs. Fred Ross left Birmingham for Seattle Saturday night to attend the funeral services.

**9 O'CLOCK TOWN VISIONS OF CHRIST BY MAN**

**Will Continue Forever, Lecturer Declares**

That visions of the eternal Christ will continue to appear to human consciousness as long as they endure was emphasized by Paul A. Harsch, a member of the Board of Lectureship of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., in a free lecture given here the afternoon of Nov. 25, in the auditorium of Baldwin High School.

The lecture was sponsored by the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Birmingham.

Mr. Harsch pointed out the various ways in which the ever-present Christ appeared to human consciousness throughout the millenniums that constitute our world, up to the time of Mary Baker Eddy, the discoverer and founder of Christian Science, to whom the Redeeming Christ came, as she expressed it in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," the "true idea of living good, the divine message from God to man pointing the way to human consciousness."

Divine Ide Infinite

Mr. Harsch made clear that that which is divine must always lead to and come from God; that it must possess the qualities of omnipotence, omniscience and omnipresence; that a divine idea must always have existed and be existing in its expression, even as that from which it springs. **GIRL SCOUTS MAY GET CAMPING SITE**

City Commission Considers Giving Use Of Tract At Springdale Park

Provided a suitable tract can be found, the city will give to the Girl Scouts of Birmingham the free use of a section of Springdale Park for a day-camp site.

This was indicated at the meeting of the City Commission Monday night, when the members present favorably to the request of a delegation of Girl Scout council representatives for the use of a plot of ground at the Park, large enough to allow for the placing of an overnight camping site. The delegation was headed by Mrs. F. W. DuBois, 261 Greenwood avenue.

Members of the Commission agreed with the delegation that the most accurate map of the property and its location to enable the city to determine exactly where the boundaries are, final decision was deferred until these can be fixed. Commissioner Luther Heacock was instructed to carry out the investigation.

In the event a satisfactory site can be found, the camp lodge will probably be made from a small building, now abandoned, which was formerly used by the city as a barn on the north side of the Springdale Park site, and which was later as a tool shed for CW A sewer construction projects. The building was recently damaged by fire, but Mrs. DuBois said her organization would be willing to have it repaired, moved to the camp site and converted into a lodge.

The city Manager James W. Parry said, "There will be no more use for the building."

Mrs. DuBois explained that local Girl Scouts have never had a camp of their own, and that the Springdale Park site would be a most ideal camping place for Birmingham.

It could be used the year around for short canoe trips, although it would not be large enough for a long-period summer camp, she said.

**Solomon's Example**

"He spoke of the divine demand that came in a dream to Solomon: 'What shalt thou give thee?' and he explained that the quest inspired by a profound desire for spiritual good could have responded as he did, if he had not been inspired by an understanding heart to judge the people, that I may discern before me the things that are true."

Here Mr. Harsch made clear that all may follow the example of Solomon, all may gain the blessing of assurance of good just ahead and of even greater good to follow; but he emphasized that the constant, conscious desire for a larger knowledge of God—a yearning desire for good which enabled these ancient ones to recognize so effectively the presence of the Christ.
