St. Mary's Contest Sets 'Gate' Record

The Baldwin High School Varsity Club saw direct results in its campaign to get more people to attend basketball games last Friday evening at the Baldwin-St. Mary's tilt. More than 400 people, 220 of them students who had purchased their tickets at an advance sale sponsored by the club, crammed their way in to the Baldwin gym to see the Maroon five topple the Lakenme. Louis M. Randall, business manager of the schools, said that \$55 was taken in at the game, which is the largest local basketball "gate" since the 1913-32 season. Two weeks ago at the East Detroit tilt, \$45 in admissions were collected. Last season's high was \$44, collected at the Royal Oak game.

Council Officers To Be Installed

Three Junior High Schools Held Elections; Presidential Candidates Tied At Baldwin

Officers of the student council in three junior high schools were elected during the past week. In all three schools the new officers will be installed Friday afternoon.

A unique situation developed at Baldwin when two candidates for the presidency, Robert Koger and Helen Shaver, each received 21 votes. Jane Dougherty, a third candidate, polled 31 ballots. Another vote will be taken to break the tie. Koger was elected vice-president, and Arthur Neff, polled the most votes for vice-president. Other candidates were Jean Larson and Janie Hyatt for president; Hoyt Morris for vice-president; and Walter Sippl and Virginia Barder for secretary-treasurer.

As the candidate receiving the second highest number of votes for president acts as vice-president of the Barnum Council, and as there were only two candidates at Baldwin, the candidates elected to an office. Walter Forbes polled the largest number of votes for secretary-treasurer, while Jack Bell was chosen vice-president. Constance Peck defeated Arthur Lambie for the secretary-treasurer's office.

"One of the fastest games I ever refereed."

That's what Robert Peil, director of athletics at Lincoln High School in Ferndale, who officiated at the Baldwin-St. Mary game here Friday had to say after the contest.
