All Birminghamites interested in puppetry have been invited to attend the first Michigan Puppetry conference, to be held at Wayne University, Cass and Warren avenues, Detroit, at 9:30 P. M. today. It has been organized by Paul McPharlin of Winthrop drive, instructor in puppet making and puppet play production at the College of Education, and director of the Marionette Fellowship, Benjamin March, of the University of Michigan, will speak on puppets in China, and there will be a display of puppets made in Detroit schools. Elberly, Ward Will Address Father-Son Service At M. E. Church

Two of the University of Michigan's most outstanding athletes, one of whom is a Birmingham boy and a graduate of Baldwin High School, are scheduled to address a Father and Son service at the Methodist Church here at 8 P. M. Sunday.

Tom Elberly, captain of this year's track team at Michigan, and the son of Mr. W. H. Elberly, will give a talk. Ward Williams, famous Negro athlete, recognized as one of the best performers in both football and basketball, will be another deliver a message of special interest to the boys.

All men and boys of the community are invited to attend the service, which will open with a group of selections by the Baldwin High School Orchestra, under the direction of Arnold W. Bernat.

The story of how Elberly first came to try out for a track team at Michigan is of special interest here, since it was another Birmingham resident, Rod Cox, former U. of M. football player and star in basketball, who told him the story as follows:

"Two years ago Rod Cox, the hammer thrower on the team, told me about a boy at his fraternity house who thought he'd like to run. He'd played basketball and was in condition and he thought he could run the 440."

"I had a whole flock and when I told Rod to send him down."

"We gave Elberly a suit and he showed up every day and practiced. I didn't pay much attention to him because I had 440 such men as Russell, the Big Ten champion, and De Baker, Turner, Eckovick and Glading."

"When the time came to pick the relay team I had an elimination on this kid Elberly could really run. The only way to pick the relay team was to have an elimination, so we had three races. In the first race Elberly beat Glading, in fact he was 100 yards ahead of me."

"In the last one Elberly turned on the heat and won by a mile and a half."

"We put him in to run first in the conference relay, a tough assignment. He came in in Birmingham yard lead. We broke the conference relay record by two seconds. The only way Elberly was regular 440 and he couldn't run 440 to see him so the quarter this year in 48.5. Anybody that comes down here now and says he thinks he can run will get plenty of attention. You never can tell."

Shall The United States Suspend Its Constitution

(Note: This is the second installment of a lecture delivered at the annual convention of the Michigan Federation of Laborers and Craftsmen, held at the Hotel Statler, Detroit, Feb. 12, 1934, by Louis H. Feed, justice of the Michigan Supreme Court, and Chairman of the Committee on the Constitution. The lecture will be concluded in an early issue.)

One of the dangers of temporarily setting aside the Constitution is that you cannot very well get back to it again, certainly as to any measure with permanent purpose and effect. And another is that when you relax in any respect, there is no restraint in relaxing it in another. There are no degrees of suspension. The Constitution is either in full force or it is not. Representative government is not controlled by rules of general and equal application or it is not representative government.

The whole course of legislation, administration and judicial decision is ruled by fundamental principles. The Constitution is not a mere collection of rules or it is not representative government. Not a Rigid Document

The United States Constitution has not demonstrated by argument or experience that full government relief is the greatest good to the greatest number of people—can not be granted without the Constitution. The Constitution is not a rigid document which hamstringing the government and oppresses the people. In an emergency, the same rights of the Constitution, things may be done under the police power which can not be done in other circumstances.

The state and nation have all the power and authority that they need to do things which will be for the benefit of the people and which will not injure the rights of the people. No government is entitled to more power. In an emergency, the same rights of the Constitution, things may be done under the police power which can not be done in other circumstances.

Suppose I want to go to a store and buy a pair of shoes. I will behave myself I go along as I walk on the street. A state law or a federal law which would deny me the right would deny me a policeman undertook to stop me.

But suppose one of the buildings along the route is on fire, and a policeman is thrown across the street. My rights have changed because of the emergency. A law or order allowing such fire lines to be cut is valid. It is not a matter of law, but, and here is the essential point, neither law nor officer can restrict me from making my own lawful route to my destination.

A Distinction Those who claim that, because the courts already have approved emergency legislation, their own particular laws should be sustained in the name of the Constitution, point out that distinction. When your newspapers inform you that a law has been passed, that is the emergency act and another emergency law has been held unconstitutional by the courts. The example will occur to you. Naturally you may assume that the court thought the law was unconstitutional because of its arbitrary nature, but the people reaching their destination by any lawful route.

All of us can agree to the latter part of the theory, and for a hundred years ago, they say it ought to be the theory and in the light of modern conditions. The fact that it is old does not mean the Constitution should not be applied to modern life. The Commandments are older than the Constitution. When you deal with principles, you have no application to existing conditions, and therefore, in the light of existing conditions, the Commandments do not change the principles. The Commandment, "Thou shalt not steal," is a principle, and the high financing of the boom period. The books are full of cases where the courts have refused to give new application demanded by the needs of the times.
