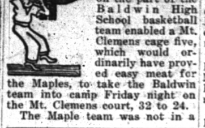
Maples' PLAY IS BELOW PAR

Cranbrook Matmen Remain Undefeated

Defeat Cleveland and University School Grapplers 20 to 14, For Third Straight Victory

Cranbrook School's undefeated wrestlers were victorious for the third time this season when they conquered the matmen from Cleveland University School by a count of 20 to 14 in the Cranbrook gym Saturday afternoon.

The Clevelanders won the first two matches on decisions, Jones defeating John A. Bradshaw, 14 to 10, and Herrick beating Robinson of Cranbrook on a time advantage, the 105-pound group.

After Cleveland had defeated the 115-pound division, Lyman of Cranbrook made the score 10 to 6 for his team by pinning Rutledge in 5 minutes, 45 seconds.

Walter Herrick added five more points to the Cranbrook total, tossing his opponent in the shortest match of the meet, 1 minute, 3 seconds. In the next bout, Matthews of Cleveland scored the only fall for his squad by pinning John Clement only 12 seconds before the time limit.

With the count 15 to 11 in Cranbrook's favor, Carl Clement clinched the meet for the Blue and Gray by throwing Essick in 6 minutes, 26 seconds. Every wrestling clinching's three points gained by a decision over Ben Osburn in the heavyweight class, the Cleveland team lost by six points. Actually they won more matches than did Cranbrook, but the latter's victories were all on falls, while only one of Cleveland's was scored in this manner.
