**LATEST FACTS ON GAMES AND PENALTIES**

MORE THAN ever before our best players want to know the latest facts on the subject of the relative values of games and penalties. Among our best bidders an average rubber is 900 points. The winner of the first game will win eight rubbers played. To win four out of the eight rubbers, averaging 1,100 points each. Three will be best two in three game rubbers, averaging 800 points each. The losers of the first game will win two rubbers averaging 800 points each. The winners of the first game average to win 4,100 points net in a series of eight rubbers, when opponents either cannot or will not save the first game by overbidding.

To win four out of the eight rubbers, so that it will average to cost his side only what he overbids to save the first game, it will pay to overbid three tricks. He doubled and got down 450 points. On eight occasions when South will get game values and West down 450 points, it will cost West 5,600 points to save these games, but his final score will be 500 points greater than if he yielded.

## Parents Told Not To Give In To Child's Fits Of Rage

"DEAR DR. MYERS: I am very much in need of advice concerning the correction of my little four-year-old daughter. She is subject to fits of rage, and is a general rebel against authority in relation to her behavior. I have tried everything I can think of, but I've tried spanking her every time she has a fit, and she doesn't seem to help either way."

Answer: It is pretty clear that your little girl has learned to use her rage to have her way. You say you have punished her. But of what avail is a little pain in the face of so much promised pleasure, aided by the urge with which nature has endowed every person? Your problem is simple so far as the child is concerned, but very complex in relation to yourself. You dislike to hear her cry, and her screams and general rage no doubt give you inward pain only you can understand. Like every other living thing, you tend to run away from immediate pain. When you do so by changing "No" to "Yes," and let the enraged youngster have her way, you get a tremendous emotional relief. In short, you get rewarded and she gets rewarded. Both of you are paid every time she gets a tantrum.

Although the pay is good now, it is being charged up against you and the child with compound interest.
