

B. H. S. RELAY TEAM TO RACE FOR TITLE

At the special invitation of Charles Hoyt, track coach at the University of Michigan, the Baldwin High School track squad which won first place in the Class B state championship meet last spring, will enter the state athletic association meet to be held in Ann Arbor the evening of Saturday, Feb. 3.

According to Coach Franklyn Whitney, Baldwin will compete in only one event, the mile relay. As yet Whitney has received no word to what other schools will be entered. The winner of the race will be officially declared the champion of the state indoor mile relay.

John McKee, one of the members of the Baldwin relay team which made such a fine showing last spring, has been graduated, but the other three runners, Bud Matthews, Bill Guckelberg and

Don Donaldson, are still eligible to compete. Whitney is holding workouts in the Baldwin gym, to select another man to fill McKee's shoes.

The Baldwin squad journeyed to Ann Arbor last Saturday and worked out on the track in Yost Field House, where the meet will be held. Whitney expects to take the outfit over again this Saturday for another practice session.

This is the first meet of its kind ever held, but officials hope to make it an annual event.

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
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
