Your Police Department

This department functions 24 hours a day—365 days a year. It is constantly on guard, protecting the interests of everyone in the community. Scout cars and motorcycles on Traffic and Residential Patrol cover an average of 365 miles a day. Last year the value of property reported stolen or lost totaled \$16,324.55 of which \$14,119.59 was recovered.

Your Fire Department

In 1930 the Michigan Inspection Bureau lowered the Birmingham Insurance rating from class 7 to class 6. This saved the people of Birmingham approximately \$200,000 in premium over a 3 year period. The efficiency of your fire department determines the insurance rate of your community.

Your Streets and Sewers

This department's operations include: sweeping pavements, cleaning gutters, gatching and sealing pavements and curbs, grading gravel roads and cleaning ditches, cleaning catch-basins, cleaning sewers, servicing pumping station and operating disposal plants.

Your Public Health Service

This department performs the following services to the community: Communicable Disease Control, Field Nursing and Sanitary Inspection. It is a safeguard to the Health of the community.

Your Justice Court

This Court furnishes the least expensive method of rendering effectual the law-enforcing activities of the Police Department. It also protects Civil rights, to which everyone is entitled.

Your Public Library

Contains 13,393 books—serving a registration of 54,085, or 88% of the city population. The Circulation for 1933 was 82,485.

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MALEE CAGERS TAKE 2 GAMES

Score Victories Over Ypsilanti Lincoln And East Detroit Quintets

Ypsilanti's Ypsilanti team, which finished the first half of its 1933-34 season with a record of four wins in seven starts for a percentage of 57.1.

Friday at Ypsilanti, the Baldwin team outplayed the Lincoln High quintet, 20 to 21. Playing East Detroit here Saturday night, the Maples downed the Halfway team, 28 to 24. The Baldwin reserve team, although winning on Friday from the Ypsilanti seconds, 29 to 10, dropped its game with the East Detroit second team, 25 to 17.

Saturday's game proved to be the best of the two variety frays. The Detroit team started with a bang and had scored nine points before the Maples were able to tally one. The Maples began to find themselves in the last of the first chapter, however, and at the end of the quarter the score was 12 to 7 in favor of the Detroit.

Detroit Offense Curbed

In the second period, the Baldwin team held the Halfway team to a single field goal, thrown by Chuck Hemmings. The Maples, however, continued from where

Maroons To Play St. Mary's Friday

St. Mary's High School of Orchard Lake, which for the past two years has won the C state basketball championship, will face the Maroon and White quintet on the Baldwin floor Friday evening. St. Mary's has no second team, but Coach Franklin Whitney plans to book a game with the Baldwin reserves before Friday. The preliminary will start at 7 o'clock.

Last year the St. Mary's team handed Baldwin its first defeat of the season after it had won its first six games.

They had left off in the first stanza, Fred Schwartz and Kenneth McBride, Baldwin's two forwards, scored seven points between them and half time the count was knotted at 14-14.

From the opening of the last half until the last few minutes of the game, neither team held a lead of more than one point. McBride, first to score, sent the Maples ahead with a free toss. Bob Walczak gave his team a one-point lead with a near shot from mid-floor. Again McBride scored, this time a short shot on a pass from Schwartz, but again the lead went to the Halfway five when Bud Ambuechler and Johnny Eberhardt sank free throws. Once more McBride came back, and with a field goal on a one-arm toss from the foul line placed the Maples one point ahead at the quarter ended.

Tony Freeman, Bob Mix, Schwartz and McBride did the Baldwin scoring in the final period. Freeman and Mix both netted foul throws and McBride sank a free toss and a field goal, while Schwartz found the basket for two field goals, one a one-handed shot and the other a toss from the corner. Hemmings and Eberhardt both sank free tosses and Ambuechler and Randall netted field goals for East Detroit.

"Spot" Pass Used

The Detroit team presented one of the most peculiar types of offensive play the Maples have run into this season. The team broke unusually fast the minute it got the ball, and after it had worked the sphere in near the basket, used a "spot" pass—that is, the player would pass to a certain place on the floor and by the time the ball had arrived a man was there to receive it. For the first two stanzas this style was quite successful, but in the last half, when the Baldwin cagers had caught on to it and kept their eyes on the ball instead of on the players, it had little scoring value. Kenneth McBride not only was high scorer of the game, but also accounted for more points than any other Baldwin player has made in any previous game this season. He netted five goals from the field and sank five free tosses for a total of 15 points.

The Ypsilanti team that faced Baldwin was a badly crippled one. Three of its regular players were out of the line-up with injuries and the squad that took the floor was made up mostly of second team members.

Reserves Used

The Maroon second team that Coach Franklin Whitney started proved to be of about the same caliber as the Lincoln outfit. The reserves played the first quarter and the score stood 5-4 all when Whitney replaced them with the first five. The regulars began scoring as soon as they entered the game, and at the half the score was 11 to 6 for Baldwin. At the end of the third period the Maroons still led, 20 to 12.

Whitney again put his second team on the floor, but this time the Ypsilanti was just a shade better than the reserves, and when Lincoln began to score, Whitney called out his regulars again. Ypsilanti scored nine counters in the last period, and Baldwin eight.

Larry Jones, Ypsilanti center who stands 6 feet 7 inches weighs 230 pounds, was the mainstay of the losers' offense. The Lincoln team would loop in high passes that

He told Whitney, "You people in Birmingham better be careful or students from your school will be making up the whole Michigan track squad."

Last year Rod Cox, a Baldwin graduate, was the number one runner on the U. of M. squad. This year Tom Ellerby, another Baldwin alumnus, is the team's captain. Tom and his brother, Dick, who is also out for the squad, are expected to do some big things for Michigan this season.

Commenting on Clayton Bradford, who ran the half mile for night, Tom Ellerby said, "I don't think anyone is off his nut or that school is going to be held at night. The thing of the bell will be only a part of the Baldwin Varsity Club's campaign to increase the attendance at basketball games, and will be to notify fans that it's time for the game of St. Mary's of Orchard Lake."

The club has mapped out an extensive campaign to increase the size of the basketball crowds. The group plans to sell numbered tickets to students and at the games draw out two numbers, the holder of each of which will receive a free ticket to the next home game. The club also plans to whitewash notices of games on sidewalks in the business district and place a billboard announcing the contests on the corner of Maple and Woodward avenues.

The club has taken over the program for all pep meetings, which are held each Friday before a game. In the past, these pep meetings have been in charge of the cheer leaders. The Varsity Club plans to offer either a speaker or musical program at each meeting.

Joe Steffee is chairman of the committee working on the campaign. Other members are Jack Sager, Herb McBride and Randall Kidder.

BAND, ORCHESTRA TO GIVE CONCERT

First Of Free Monthly Series By Baldwin Group To Be Presented Sunday
