1,731 WISE POOL PLAYGROUNDS FIRST WEEK

Recreation Program Still Handicapped By Lack of Materials COMMISSION DENIES AID Despite the handicap caused by lack of materials, Birmingham's FERA recreation program provided relaxation and exercise for 1,731 persons during the first four days it was in operation last week, according to Miss Miriam Brown, general supervisor. This number includes those who used the Barnum swimming pool as well as those who took part in activities at the five school playgrounds.
