The tests are being made possible through the co-operation of sponsors of the local recreation program and the Oakland and Wayne County Chapters of the Red Cross.
Mrs. Nellie Hall, a member of the water safety staff of the Wayne County Chapter, will be in charge of the tests. Mrs. Hall is a swimming instructor at the Technical High School, Detroit, where she has developed many excellent swimmers.
