

### Funeral Services Held

Cemetery Superintendent, Former Resident Here, Dies in Flint

Funeral services for John Albert Wendorph, former prominent resident of Birmingham and for 17 years superintendent of Roseland Park Cemetery, were held Saturday afternoon, following his death late Wednesday night of last week at his home, 5700 North Saginaw street, Flint.

Mr. Wendorph, who was 65 years old, died of heart disease after an illness of 10 weeks. The services were held at White Chapel Memorial Cemetery, of which Mr. Wendorph's son, J. Howard Wendorph, is superintendent. The Rev. Dr. E. H. Longman, pastor of the Central Christian Church, of Flint, officiated. The body was entombed at White Chapel.

Mr. Wendorph came to Birmingham in 1909 and lived here until about three and a half years ago, when he moved to Flint to become superintendent of Grace Park Cemetery there. He was superintendent of Roseland Park from 1905 until 1926. He was born in West Sand Lake, N. Y. and before coming to Birmingham had been superintendent of cemeteries in New York and New Jersey. He was a member of both the state and national associations of cemetery superintendents.

Mr. Wendorph was elected to the Birmingham Village Commission in 1913 and served for two years. He was a member of the Village Planning Commission from 1926 until he went to Flint, and at one time also a member of the Birmingham Rotary Club.

Prominent in lodge work, he was a past chancellor of Knights of Pythias Lodges in three grand domains. He was a member of the Birmingham K. of P. Lodge No. 149, and of the I. O. O. F. Surviving, besides the son, are the widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Wendorph; four daughters, Mrs. Richard Lawler, Mrs. Stella Edgar, Mrs. Charles Olin and Mrs. Emil Olin, all of Birmingham; a sister, George Snyder, of Sacramento, Cal., and eight grandchildren.

### Garage Remodeling Will Be Continued

Bloomfield Hills Commission Finds Cost Will Exceed Original Estimate

Despite the fact that the cost will exceed the original estimate by about \$1,500, the Bloomfield Hills City Commission has decided to complete the work of remodeling the Bloomfield Township garage to house the city's fire departments.

The city will come into possession of the garage under the terms of the settlement for the division of joint assets and liabilities of Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills and Bloomfield Township. Remodeling of the garage was approved as a work-week project, and the work was started several weeks ago.

At that time it was estimated the expense to the city would be about \$5,500 for supervision and materials, but this will probably be increased to \$4,940 before the job is completed. The Commission was informed by Justice H. A. O'Dell, architect, who did the architectural work. He and the other suppliers in charge of the project were given a vote of confidence and instructed to finish the job. Commissioners Clarence E. Osher and Commissioner Harry S. Starr, appointed by Mayor Donald D. Farrington to serve as a committee to confer with Perry A. Vaughn, Bloomfield Township supervisor, on the possibility of combining the fire departments of the two units after the city becomes installed in its new quarters. They were asked to report their recommendations back to the Commission for approval.

### ONE MAN JAILED, TWO OTHERS FINED IN HILLS

Patrick H. Carlin, 28 years old, of 4448 University avenue, Chicago, was sentenced to serve 30 days in jail for drunk driving when arrested Monday morning before Justice H. A. O'Dell of Bloomfield Hills. Rex Farmer, 42-year-old real estate agent, of 574 Woodland avenue, Detroit, was fined \$100 for reckless driving, and Harry M. Norton, 26, a dentist of 975 East Stewart street, Flint, was fined \$10 for disorderly conduct. All three men were arrested in Bloomfield Hills Sunday morning.

### Driver Fined \$75 After Auto Crash

Clawson Man Admits Guilt in Collision in Which Woman Was Injured

Phillip Homrich, 34-year-old automobile worker, of 117 Nahama avenue, Clawson, was fined \$75 for drunk driving by Justice Forbes S. Huseell Monday morning as the outcome of an accident in which Homrich was driving a car south on Woodward avenue when it crashed into the rear of another car which had stopped at a traffic light at Brown street. A woman riding with Homrich suffered a severe laceration on one ear when she was thrown partly through the windshield. The second car was driven by William F. Davis, 32 years old, of 162 South Burgess street, Columbus, O. Neither he nor Homrich was hurt.

After the accident, police said, Homrich and his companion took refuge in the home of friends living on Cole street, where Homrich was found and arrested. He pleaded guilty to the drunk driving charge.

The accident, police said, occurred at the intersection of Woodward and Brown streets. The car driven by Homrich was traveling south on Woodward when it struck the rear of the car driven by Davis, which was stopped at a traffic light at Brown street.

### CITY OF BIRMINGHAM Ordinance Number 207

An ordinance to regulate and license hawk, peddling and street vending and to prohibit persons, firms, or corporations from peddling, peddling or vending goods, merchandise, or services within the limits of the City of Birmingham without a license and to provide penalties for violation of the provisions thereof, and to repeal all ordinances heretofore in conflict herewith of the City of Birmingham.

SECTION 1. That for the purposes of this ordinance, hawk, peddle, peddling or vending shall mean the offering for sale or for lease or for hire or offering for sale at retail, goods, wares, merchandise, services, or other things of value, either traveling on foot, or in a vehicle, or by offering or crying the same from the street. It shall include the driver of every vehicle used for hawking, peddling or vending. It shall include those who sell by taking orders for goods from samples, lists or catalogs, and shall not include any individual selling goods of his own raising, production, or manufacture, or person selling or person selling or person selling goods or wares from samples, lists or catalogs, when the goods in the unbroken package are to be delivered to the purchaser by direct shipment into Michigan from another state; it being the intent hereof that neither the provisions hereof nor their application shall unlawfully interfere with interstate commerce. It shall not include individual selling goods of their own raising, production, or manufacture, or other goods, not of their own raising, production, or manufacture, for sale.

SECTION 2. No person, firm, or corporation shall engage in the business of hawking or peddling at retail, any goods or wares, merchandise, or services, on a door or upon the street, alley, or public place of the city, or in a room or rooming house, on foot or with a vehicle or by offering or crying the same, or by taking orders therefor for delivery to the purchaser, unless the person first having obtained a license therefor as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 3. The city clerk is hereby authorized and directed to have applied the blanks for licenses provided in a copy of this ordinance and the amendments thereto printed thereon, or attached thereto. No more than one person shall operate under any license. No license issued hereunder shall be transferable, and the person, firm, or corporation to whom such license has been issued shall be deemed responsible for all transactions had thereunder. Any person, firm, or corporation applying for a license shall file with this ordinance shall first make out and file with the city clerk a written application, stating the full name, address and local address of the applicant, the period or length of time it is proposed to operate under such license and stating in detail the articles, goods, wares, merchandise, or services which the applicant desires to sell or vend under the terms of said license, and no article, good, ware, merchandise, or service that such as may be named in such application shall be sold or vend under the terms of said license.

SECTION 4. All licenses issued shall be the provisions of this ordinance shall, in all events, expire at midnight on the 31st day of December of each year.

SECTION 5. For each license issued under the provisions of this ordinance, the applicant shall pay to the city treasurer the appropriate fee according to the following schedule:

The city treasurer shall properly account for such fees and shall deposit them to the credit of the general fund of the city.

SECTION 6. Upon receipt of the application for a license hereunder, and the payment of the appropriate fee, and being satisfied that the applicant is of good moral character, the city clerk shall issue a license to the applicant, which license shall be signed by the clerk and shall be valid for the period of time specified in the application.

SECTION 7. No person, firm, or corporation shall engage in the business of hawking or peddling, as defined in this ordinance, within the corporate limits of this city, after one hour after the setting of the sun on any day.

SECTION 8. Any person, firm, or corporation who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not more than \$500, or to imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or to both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 9. It shall be the duty of every person securing a license under the provisions of this ordinance to preserve the same and to exhibit the same to any police officer at any time or place, or to any other person authorized by the city manager for violation of this ordinance.

SECTION 10. Any license issued hereunder shall be subject to the provisions of this ordinance, and shall be subject to the provisions of this ordinance, and shall be subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 11. Should any of the provisions of this ordinance be held invalid, such invalidity shall not be held to affect the other provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 12. All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 13. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not to exceed FIFTY and no more than ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$50.00), and in default of the payment of such fine, the person shall be imprisoned in the County Jail for not less than 30 days, but not exceeding thirty days.

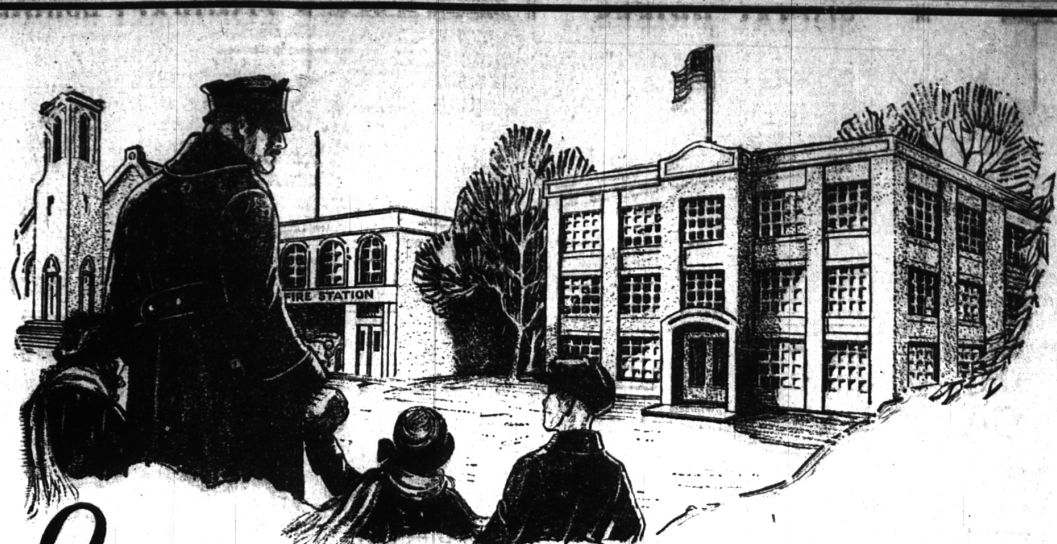
This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication after the next meeting.
