

HIT-RUN DRIVER GETS 1-5 YEARS

Detroit—Whose Truck Wrecked Six Cars in Bloomfield Hills Sent to Jackson Prison

Charged with leaving the scene of an accident after a truck he was driving had crashed into six cars in a wild ride on Woodward avenue between Square Lake and Long Lake roads in Bloomfield Hills on June 30, Russell Lafnar, 29-year-old furnace repairman of 1741 Lombard avenue, Detroit, was sentenced to serve one to five years in Michigan State Prison at Jackson Monday by Circuit Judge Frank L. Covert. Lafnar was arrested by Patrolman Stanley Kevern of the Bloomfield Hills police department at Woodward avenue and Frowder road, where Lafnar had fled after jumping over a fence in front of the W. T. Barbour estate. Lafnar's truck had crashed into the fence after wrecking the six cars.

Lafnar was drunk when arrested, Kevern said, and was unable to recall details of the ride. A woman passenger in one of the six cars was slightly injured.

City Returns Profit At Bloomfield Park

May, June Revenues Exceed Expenses \$338,777 Tells Commission

Revenues at Bloomfield Park for May and June, the first two months it has been operated under the management of the City of Birmingham, totalled \$3,218, while expenses were \$2,980, leaving a profit of \$238, City Manager James W. Parry reported to the Commission recently. Both revenues and expenses were higher than had been anticipated, he said.

For the same two months last year, when the park was owned and operated by Bloomfield Township, receipts were \$2,291 and expenses, \$1,973, Mr. Parry told the Commission.

The Commission had appropriated \$2,500 for Park expenses during May and June, and this amount was exceeded principally because of the construction work needed to get the place into shape for the opening of the season, the manager explained. This included the re-setting of 400 feet of fence, construction of three bridges and two drinking fountains, expansion of the water and sprinkling systems, relaying of 400 feet of sidewalk, drainage repairs and alterations, and considerable work on trees and greens.

The Park payroll was \$838 for May and \$725 for June, Mr. Parry reported. Green fees amounted to \$846 in May and \$1,095 in June; club house rentals, \$15 in May and \$28 in June; and merchandise sales, \$412 in May and \$688 in June.

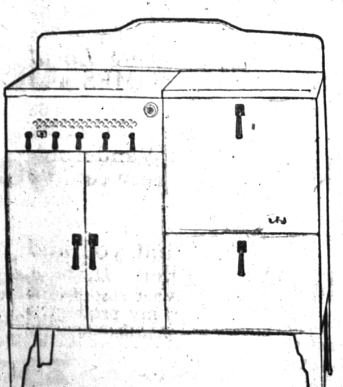
