### CONTRACT BRIDGE

**AMBITIOUS BIDDING**

SOME PLAYERS indulge in bids out of proportion to their values. They bid high, but they may fulfill contracts which slightly different card distributions would make impossible. The hand today is of that order.

♠ 10  
♥ J 10 9 4  
♦ A 9 5 3  
♣ 7 4 3 2

♠ A Q J 5  
♥ A K 8 7  
♦ A Q 6 7

Neither side was vulnerable. Bid was 1-2-3-4. West, 1-Spade; East, 2-Diamonds; West, 2-Hearts; East, 3-Clubs, which was the first objective. West, 3-Hearts, to show that he was bidding long suits, with the same number of cards in each; East, 3-Spades; West, 4-Spades, which should have ended the auction; East, 4-No Trumps, to show the Aces of both suits not bid by West; West, 5-Diamonds, to show his K, after his partner had shown the Ace; instead of bidding 6-Spades; West, 6-Diamonds, to bid the Q, and forcing West to bid 6-Spades. Fortunately East bid no more, but South doubled.

The opening lead was the 4 of diamonds. The 7 was played from dummy and South covered with the J. Declarer's lone K won.

West felt that the double might weaken some heart strength, but almost surely he held the K of clubs and a certain trump trick. West led his top club. Dummy's Ace won. Upon the good Ace and the 4 of diamonds West discarded his last club and his lowest heart. The Q of clubs was led from dummy against K next two tricks. ### New Kingswood Principal Expected To Arrive Friday

Miss Margaret Augur is expected to be at Kingswood School on Friday and Saturday to acquire a preliminary acquaintance with her duties as the new principal of the school. She will leave Saturday or Sunday to spend a brief vacation with her mother in Chicago, returning to Kingswood in August to take up her duties and residence there permanently.

Announcement of Miss Augur's appointment to succeed Dr. Katharine Rogers Adams as principal of Kingswood was made by Dr. Alice Lloyd of the University of Michigan, chairman of the committee on educational policies and vice-chairman of the Board of Directors at Kingswood.

For the past six years, Miss Augur has been academic dean of Bradford (Mass.) Academy, oldest girls' school in New England, where she was particularly responsible for the preparatory department and where she became an authority on collegiate standards and requirements through close association with college and university officers of admission.

Miss Augur received her early schooling in Chicago, and was graduated at the head of her class at Rosemary Hall, Greenwich, Conn., a school of which she later became associate headmistress. She attended Bryn Mawr two years, but the death of her father interrupted her studies there, and after a period of residence and travel abroad, she entered Bradford College, from which she received her degree. Later she did graduate work at Columbia University and the Universities of Chicago and Grenoble, France.

Miss Augur returned to Rosemary Hall in 1918, and three years later was appointed assistant to the headmistress. She was made associate mistress in 1921, a position she held until 1928, when she left Rosemary to become dean of Bradford Academy.

Miss Augur's father was Walter Wheaton Augur, University of Michigan graduate and prominent Chicago attorney. Her grand-

father, Newell Avery of Port Huron and Detroit, came to Michigan from Maine about 1850, and was associated with William J. Murphy and Jonathan Smith in the lumber and real estate businesses. He was a benefactor of Olive College and one of the founders of the Republican Party "under the oaks" at Jackson 80 years ago.

Dr. Adams retired from Kingswood June 30, after resigning because of ill health. She plans to spend a few months resting, after which she will leave for Europe on an extended tour.
