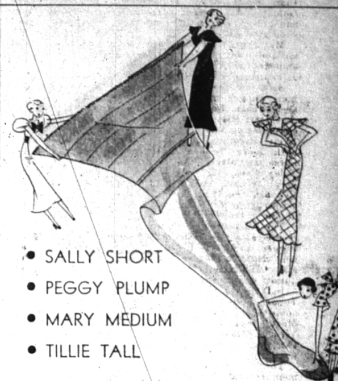

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WINNERS NAMED IN FLOWER SHOW

Mrs. John, Mrs. Garber and Mrs. Noble Show Winners in Annual Exhibition

Mrs. W. A. F. John of Footing Lane was awarded the first prize for the highest number of points and blue ribbons at the annual spring flower show of the Birmingham Branch of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association, held Monday at the community house, Mrs. Sam M. Garber, of Bloomfield Village was awarded second prize on her high score of points, and Mrs. Sheldon R. Noble of Clarkston, won the third.

Due partly to the increased season, only 73 exhibits were on display this year in comparison with 82 of a year ago. The classifications were divided into three sections or groups. In the first class of section I, Mrs. W. S. Gilbert, Jr., won first place, Mrs. Henry Whiting, second; and Mrs. Floyd Beardsley of Pontiac, third, for specimen blooms of poppies.

Prizes for specimen blooms of peonies in class two of the section were awarded to Mrs. John, first; Mrs. R. D. Baker, second; and Mrs. Royce, third. In class three, devoted to iris, Mrs. Craig H. Richey was the winner, with Mrs. Baker, second and Mrs. Beardsley, third.

Mrs. John's entry was the only one in class four, for columbine, and Mrs. D. G. Clemmer and Mrs. Beardsley won the first and second prizes, respectively, in the class for roses.

The various classes in section two were devoted to the artistic arrangement of flowers in different types of containers. Mrs. Gilbert won the first prize in this class, one of this group for her arrangement of flowers in a low bowl, Mrs. Baker, second, and Mrs. C. D. MacGregor, third.

In class seven, designated as "flowers in vase not more than 14 inches in height," Mrs. Theodor F. W. Meyer was the winner, with Mrs. E. H. McKinney, second, and Mrs. Garber, third. Mrs. John won another blue ribbon for her arrangement of flowers in pairs of vases. Mrs. Meyer ranked first in this class and Mrs. Whiting, third. Mrs. McKinney won, with Mrs. Garber, second, and Mrs. Beardsley, third. The first prize in the class for flower arrangement in miniature containers was awarded to Mrs. Clifford J. McDonald, with Mrs. Garber second, and Mrs. Charles E. Lewis, third.

Mrs. Noble, Mrs. Gilbert and Mrs. Garber, won first, second and third places in the class for floral flowering branches. In the class for the arrangement of white flowers in a white container, Mrs. Richey won the blue ribbon, Mrs. Garber won second place, Mrs. John, third. Mrs. Beardsley's entry was the only one in the class for the arrangement of flowers in vases of blue.

Mrs. Jules Agramette's blue ribbon was awarded the blue ribbon in the class for terrariums and bottle gardens, the second going to Mrs. Theodore C. Hobbs. In the class for the artistic arrangement of the formal dinner or informal luncheon table, Mrs. Noble won the blue ribbon, and Mrs. Garber, the red. Mrs. Alfred J. LaBelle made the only entry in the class for artistic flower arrangement for the seasonal table in the living room.

The final class of the show was the junior class, entries under 12 years of age, which will be arranged without assistance. There were two groups in this class, one for larger displays and one for miniature arrangements. In the former, Mrs. Garber won the first, Constance John, second and Marion Gilbert, third. In the latter division, first prize went to Sally McDonald, the second to Ann McDonald and the third to Margaret Richey.

Mrs. Garber was general chairman for the show.
