Group of 26 Will Help Carnival to Help Defray Expenses

To help defray the expenses of a group of 26 Baldwin High School students and alumni on a trip to Washington, D. C., a three-day carnival is to be held June 20, 21 and 22 on the grounds of St. James' Episcopal Church.

The Washington trip group was formed last year outside of school, after the Board of Education had indefinitely postponed further trips of the Baldwin High School Washington Group because of financial conditions.

The new group is planning to leave for Washington June 24, returning June 28. The itinerary will include Harper's Ferry, Annapolis, Alexandria and Mt. Vernon, as well as the national capital.

Open to any persons desiring to join, even though they may not be Baldwin students or alumni, the group is being sponsored by W. S. Toothacker, who was in charge of Washington Group activities at Baldwin for years, and by Helen Hammond and Eugene Hubbard, also teachers in the local high school. David Curry is the member chairman.

Some of the required funds have already been raised through group enterprises of various kinds, and the organization hopes to realize the remainder from the carnival, at which the members themselves will operate the concessions.

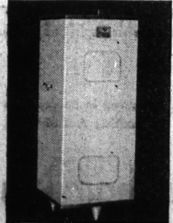
**STAUNTON ACADEMY HONORS LOCAL YOUTH**
