

Last Rites Held For Lillian E. Richards

Daughter Of Southfield Township, Pioneer Dies At Son's Home Near Bancroft

Funeral services for Mrs. Lillian E. Richards, a native of Franklin and the youngest sister of the late Mrs. Ellen C. Benedict of Bloomfield Hills, were held Friday from the home of her son, William L. Richards, of near Bancroft, Mich., where she died June 7. Burial was in Grand Lawn Cemetery, Detroit. She was 74 years old, and had been ill for nearly a year.

The youngest of a family of five daughters and three sons, and the last of the family to survive, Mrs. Richards was the daughter of pioneer settlers, Lewis W. Adams of New Hampshire and Julia Ann Tyler Adams of Connecticut. She was born Dec. 27, 1859, in a house her father built on Bingham road in Southfield Township.

She was united in marriage July 25, 1879, to Norman F. Richards, and lived on the Richards homestead near Union Plains, later moving to a farm nearby. Mr. Richards died in 1917.

Surviving, besides the son, are two daughters, Mrs. C. G. Lewis of Byron, Mich., and Mrs. C. E. Kirsh of Detroit. Another daughter, Mrs. Bertha Harrison of Detroit, died in 1927. There are six grandchildren.

Her sister, Mrs. Benedict, who was also born on Bingham road, and who lived for 60 years in her home on Woodward avenue near Lone Pine road, died last October at the age of 92.

Bingay Talks From St. James' Pulpit

Editor Says Machine-Age Science Overlooked Need For 'Oil Of The Spirit'

The material progress which science has engendered during the past three hundred years led civilization into a morass of materialism of which the World War was the inevitable result, and in the backwash of which we are still floundering, declared Malcolm W. Bingay, editorial director of the Detroit Free Press, in an address Sunday morning at St. James' Episcopal Church. Mr. Bingay was one of a group of lay speakers and visiting clergymen who are occupying the pulpit while the rector, the Rev. Warner L. Purdy, is in Arkansas for his health.

Comparing the contemporary political and economic state of the world with the confusion which followed the building of the Tower of Babel, Mr. Bingay charged the scientists in all their advancement with leaving out of their calculations one ingredient which is absolutely necessary in all mechanical endeavor.

In material mechanics this element is known as lubrication; in the mechanics of human relationships it is the "oil of the spirit," he said, and pointed out that just as one is essential to the operation of a Swiss watch, a Mogul locomotive or a fine motor car, so the other is essential to the operation of a complicated, well-balanced, smoothly-running system of social and economic justice. The former fact has always been recognized, but the truth of the latter is only now being realized, the speaker said.

The speaker this Sunday will be another layman, Charles O. Ford, executive secretary of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan.

NRA COMPLIANCE BOARD WORK ENDS

John B. Howarth, chairman of Birmingham's NRA Compliance Board, has been notified by Gen. Hugh S. Johnson, national recovery administrator that local compliance boards will go out of existence Friday, June 15, and that their work of administering the President's re-employment agreement after that time will be taken over by state NRA compliance boards. The change is being made because of the fact that only a small number of employers are still operating under the re-employment agreement, this having been replaced in most cases by approved codes, Gen. Johnson explained.
