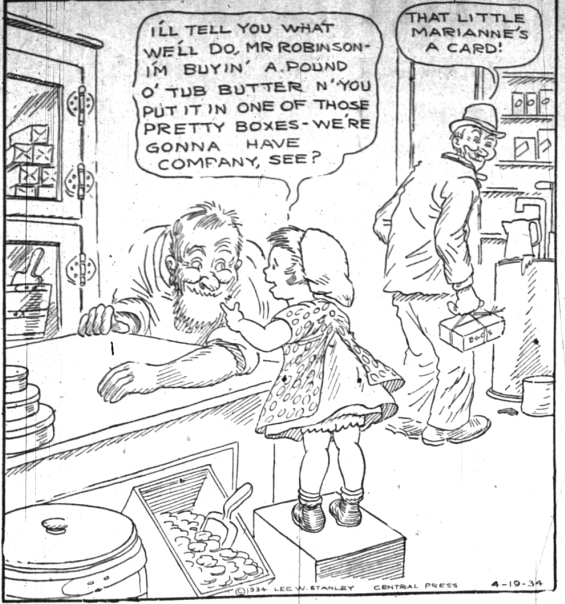

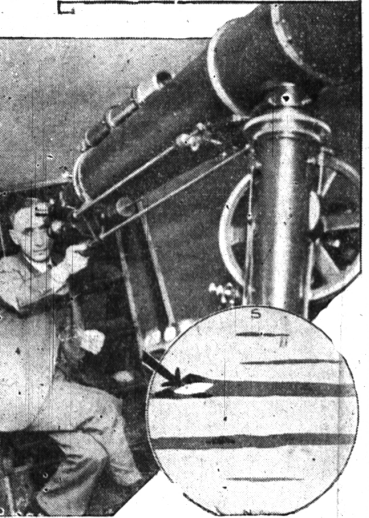

Huge Storm on Jupiter Revealed by Telescope

But Cleveland Scientist Says It Has No Bearing On Weather Conditions Here

Describing his discovery, Dr. Nassau says, "While studying the black spot I noted a large white cloud on the south equatorial belt, covering an estimated area 20,000 miles in length and 2,000 miles in width, has been observed by Prof. J. Nassau of Case School of Applied Science, Cleveland, atmospheric disturbances on the earth cannot be blamed on Jupiter, he asserts. No connection between storms on Jupiter, 400,000,000 miles distant, and storms on earth is responsible for the unusual activity on Jupiter. Dr. Nassau began observing Jupiter closely, recently, when he learned of the presence of an interesting black spot on its north equatorial belt. While searching for the black spot, which indicated condensation, of what looked as if there were a heavy accumulation of rain clouds, he saw the storm. A storm on Jupiter, just as on the earth, is a movement of great volumes of materials. Nightly, since his discovery, Dr. Nassau has trained his giant telescope upon Jupiter, where storms are known on earth do not exist and according to the present theory a solid cushion of ice covers the planet, with a temperature of approximately 300 degrees below zero Fahrenheit. Instead of diminishing in activity the storm area has been increasing with evidence of tremendous activity in the surrounding region. The common sunflower, one of the most important species in cultivation, sometimes attains a height of 20 feet and bears perfect flower heads from one to two feet in diameter.

Grown-ups Lead Kids In Adoration Of Mickey Mouse

"Anyone who walks into his theater when one of these programs is being shown will be quick to admit that Holah was dead right about the youngsters—Mickey and his pals are a real treat for the young set. "For whether Mickey is telling Minnie to love her in the very best mouse manner, or whether Pop-Eye is laying a whole crew of mice out on a limb, or whether you'll hear the loudest guffaws coming from the grown-ups instead of their children, and the grown-ups, not the children, Holah says, who clamor for more.

Making The Constitution Flexible Why Steel Union Leaders Objected Germany And Dillinger

New York, June 21.—Many businessmen are of the opinion that more flexibility of the constitution would be a stimulating thing to the nation. "A high school concerning the constitution is made when a man's ideas are questioned. When Prof. Rexford Tugwell appeared for his inquisition, he was questioned chiefly on his abiding by the constitution. "The very men who drew up the constitution back in the 1780's were they alive today, would smile at our attempts to maintain inflexible a document they drew up for a different world, a different era. "It must be understood, of course that none of their conceptions of freedom ever ought to be discarded, but it is these conceptions that are trampled by some who raise constant cries of 'Unconstitutional!' "To be sure, that isn't true of everyone. The greatest citizens of the United States have tried to protect the document because it speaks more clearly than any other constitution in the world that freedom of speech, freedom of thought and freedom of religion are fundamental. "A Tugwell ought to be questioned not on whether he stands by the constitution, but whether he will broaden its scope in behalf of the people rather than narrow it. "The present situation is a national office holder ought to be questioning on that."
