Fascists To Pay Expense Of Boys' Italian Tour
A two-months' trip to Italy, with all expenses paid by the Italian Government, and with introductions to Premier Benito Mussolini and King Victor Emmanuel III as only part of the wonderful adventure promised along the way, is the vacation to which two young Adams School students are looking forward this summer.
They are Sean Jr., and Adolph, sons of Sam Brun, proprietor of the Birmingham Fruit and Grocery Company on North Woodward avenue. They are among the 50 Italian-speaking boys of the Detroit consular district who will begin the trip July 8 as the guests of the Fascist Government, returning in mid-September.
The 50 qualified for the trip by their knowledge of the Italian language, and by tests taken recently at the Adams School. They are in charge of military authorities. The boys will take party with them to the United States in succeeding summers.
The boys will tour Italy dressed in the uniform of the Balilla, youthful Fascist organization. Landing at Naples, they will proceed to Rome, where the introductions to Mussolini and the King will take place. Then the party will spend two weeks at Livorno on the sea coast, and will visit France, Venice, Genoa, Milan and other cities before returning to America. The entire trip will be in charge of military authorities.
The boy tourists must all be between the ages of 12 and 14. Sean Brun, Jr., a ninth grade student this year at Adams School, is 19, 000 other Italian boys from all sections of the United States. The avowed purpose of the

HIGH BIDDER WINS GARBAGE LICENSE
Royal Oak Man Named City Collector At Auction Over Present Rates
Russell Brace, of R. D. 1, Royal Oak, was licensed as Birmingham's garbage collector for the coming year, beginning July 1, by the City Commission Monday night, despite the fact that he bid the sum of \$100,000 for the work as high as any of the four received, and higher than the others.
Brace agreed to take over the work at the rate of 50 cents a month per cent, or \$1.25 for three months if paid in advance. Perley Carr, the present collector, whose license expires July 1, is doing the work now at 40 cents a month per cent, or \$1 for three months when paid in advance. The collector is paid directly by the residents, the city's only function being to grant the license. The license is not compulsory.
Brace was recommended by City Manager James W. Parry, who said an investigation had convinced him his qualifications and equipment were satisfactory. Mr. Parry said he did not believe the work could continue to be done satisfactorily at the present rates, and Carr, who attended the meeting, seconded his remarks. Carr, however, told the Commission he would be unwilling to renew his contract even at a higher figure.
The lowest bidder agreed to do the work for 35 cents per client per month, or \$1.05 for three months when paid in advance. Brace conducts a hog farm in Troy Township where he intends to dispose of the garbage. Carr is now disposing of his collections at the same farm.

Two persons were injured Monday night in an automobile collision on North Woodward avenue near Reddy road. The crash occurred when Casper G. Hilton, 38 years old, of 8555 Central avenue, Detroit, stopped to look for direction signal, and was struck in the rear by a car driven by Donald P. Schroeder, 19, of 551 East Wilson avenue, Pontiac.
Hilton suffered a cut on the back of the head when the impact threw him against a five-gallon pail of paint in the back of his car. Schroeder received a cut on the forehead and a bruised chest. Both were treated by Dr. C. F. Lawler, and removed to their homes. Both cars were badly damaged.
