POLICE ARREST 8 IN WEEKEND

Five Held In Raid Admit Disorderly Conduct Charges

Five youths pleaded guilty to charges of disorderly conduct when men pleaded guilty to drunk driving and one to being drunk when they were arrested by Police Justice Forbes-Hassell Monday morning after one of the busiest weeks police here had in several months.

The five youths charged with disorderly conduct were seized in a raid on a house at 1580 Henrietta street, where police said they engaged in a free-for-all fight. All five paid fines of \$10 in order to escape 10-day jail terms.

The five were Lynn Evans, 18 years old, of Forest Lake Country Club; Howard L. Schovan, 21, of 827 Baldwin avenue, Royal Oak; Fred M. Yeager, 21, of 2245 Holcomb avenue, Detroit; Vincent McMahon, 19, of 1088 Beaconsfield avenue, Grosse Pointe; and William Hayden, Jr., 19, of 709 Baldwin avenue, Royal Oak.

The two men arrested for drunk driving were August Medella, 47 years old, of 3517 Greeley avenue, Detroit, and Virgel Holder, 26, of 750 McFarlan avenue, Flint. Medella, arrested by Deputy Sheriff Phillip Lambert, paid a \$50 fine in lieu of spending 45 days in the County Jail.

Holder was sentenced to pay a \$50 fine or spend 45 days in jail, and was held for Flint police when they called to inform authorities here that the owner of a truck Holder was driving when arrested claimed the truck had been stolen. Holder maintained he had been given permission to drive the truck from Flint to Detroit.

O. H. Williams, 45, of 802 1/2 Whittier street, Flint, who was arrested with Holder, was charged with being drunk. He was sentenced to 10 days in jail when unable to pay a \$10 fine.

Meeting On County Home Rule Called

The Oakland County Committee on County Home Rule has called a meeting of all Oakland County taxpayers to be held in Pontiac High School at 8 o'clock tonight. Discussion and explanation of the proposed amendment to the state constitution providing for county home rule is the purpose of the meeting.

The amendment, according to its sponsors, would reduce governmental expense considerably by eliminating unnecessary expenses from county payrolls. Any county would be authorized to set up a commission of government in the majority of voters preferred by referendum. No change could be made without the approval of the majority, but the county home rule idea makes it possible for changes to be suggested and considered in any county.

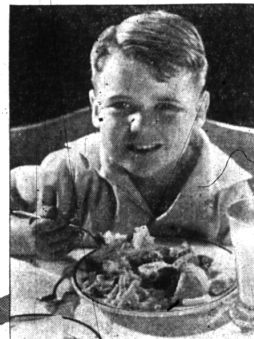
