### Saarinens, Son And Father, Win Honors

Eero Awarded Scholarship At Yale; Father Cited by Helsinki Institute

Two more high honors have recently fallen to the Saarinens family of Cranbrook.

Eero Saarinens, 25-year-old son of Eleri Saarinens, president of the Cranbrook Academy of Art, has been awarded an eight months' traveling scholarship by President James Rowland Angell, of Yale University. The scholarship represents the highest honor in the College of Architecture at Yale.

Young Saarinens completed the five-year architectural course in three years, and has won eight medals in various competitions, including one for the best all round performance of the year.

Recently the honorary title of Doctor of Technology was conferred upon Eleri Saarinens by the Institute of Technology of Helsinki, Finland. Last year the University of Michigan conferred the title of Doctor of Science upon Mr. Saarinens, who holds the gold medal of the New York Architectural League.

### 200 TO ATTEND CONFERENCE

Capacity Enrollment Predicted For Annual Gathering At Cranbrook

Advance registrations for the third annual Cranbrook Summer Conference which opens Sunday indicate that the enrollment will reach the 200 limit, and that several late registrants will have to be turned away, it was announced yesterday by sponsors of the gathering.

The conference, sponsored by the religious education department of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan, will continue through Saturday, June 30. Several of the outstanding educational leaders of the diocese are scheduled to conduct training and lecture courses and symposiums daily.

Again this year, one of the features of the parley will be a demonstration school, under the direction of Miss Mary Beckett of Bay City. Classes will be held at Brookside Cranbrook every morning from Monday through Friday, 10:30 to 12:30 o'clock, in singing, Bible study, and handicraft.

### 2 Mills Statues Accepted In Europe

Stockholm, London Approves Statues Of Cranbrook Academy Sculptors

Carl Milles, sculptor at the Cranbrook Academy of Arts, returned last Thursday from a trip to London and Stockholm, cities for which he is designing fountains.

In Stockholm, Mr. Milles presented officials with the first photographs of the great Orpheus Fountain, the plaster models of which were viewed by thousands when they were exhibited at Mr. Milles' studio this spring.

Mr. Milles has worked for three years on the fountain but it will be some time before it is in its place in the square before the Concert Hall in Stockholm. Final corrections in the plaster must be made, the models must be packed and shipped, and the fountain cast in Stockholm.

The sketch of the memorial fountain for Anna Pavlova, which is to be placed in Regent's Park, London, has been accepted by the English Parliament. Nothing may be placed in the park without the approval of Parliament and the recommendation of the minister of education.

The garden will surround the completed fountain in the London park.

There will also be out-door play sessions, tours of the various Cranbrook institutions, and daily worship periods at Christ Church Cranbrook conducted by the Rev. W. Hamilton Aulenbach, assistant rector. The school, which is for all children from kindergarten through eighth grade, will close with a pageant and service in the church at 3 P. M. Friday, followed by a reception in the Guild Hall for the parents of the students. Attendance at the school will be limited to 100 children.

A course recently added to the conference curriculum is one entitled "Personal Development of Children," to be given by Dr. Louis A. Schwartz, who was sent to Detroit a few years ago by Yale University to do research in family relationships. Later he taught mental hygiene for three years at the University of Michigan and now is psychiatrist at Harper's Hospital, Detroit.

The Rev. William R. Kinder, rector of St. Joseph's Church, Detroit, director of the conference, will conduct the opening services at Christ Church Cranbrook Sunday evening.

Among the conference leaders will be the Rt. Rev. Herman Page, bishop of Michigan; Dean Kirk P. Haggren, Archdeacon Leonard B. Haggren, Miss Elizabeth Thomas, superintendent of religious education of the diocese; Charles O. Ford, diocesan secretary; the Rev. Herman R. Page of St. Paul's, Dayton, O., son of Bishop Page; Van Francis Garrett, director of religious education at St. Paul's, Flint; the Rev. Benedict Williams of Trenton Church, Detroit; the Rev. Irwin C. Johnson of St. John's, Detroit; and Miss Ida Jenks, director of religious education at St. Joseph's, Detroit.

Other leaders will be the Rev. I. E. Charles of Epiphany Church, Detroit; the Rev. Kervod Alexander of St. Peter's, Hillsdale; the Rev. Francis B. Craemer of Christ Church, Grosse Pointe; the Rev.
