

### Four Horses Added To 'Y' Camp Stable

Elberly Again To Be Horsemanship Supervisor At Loon Lake Site, Opening Sunday

Horse-back riding promises to be one of the leading activities this summer at the Y. M. C. A. summer camp on Loon Lake, which opens Sunday. Four horses from the Devonshire Downs Stables in Bloomfield Hills have been added to the group of one horse and three ponies which were at the camp last summer, and all eight animals will be at the disposal of the campers throughout the two-month camping period.

Richard Elberly will again be supervisor of horsemanship this year, assisted by Glen Waggoner. Both are Birmingham residents and both are trained horsemen.
