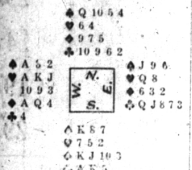

CONTRACT BRIDGE

A PRE-EMPTIVE OVERCALL.
IF YOU THINK that you can make it, bid game over an opening bid of no trumps. This is the sound rule followed by West when he overcalled South's bid of 1 No Trump, with 4 Hearts.



Dummy may be entered with a heart, and a diamond led from dummy will give the declarer two tricks in that suit. Having pulled trumps, the declarer can win another spade trick, by allowing North to win with his Q. The next spade lead will belong to dummy. The fourth-best spade lead will cause the declarer to jump a single trick in each of three suits—spades, diamonds and clubs.

What should North lead? How many tricks can West win against the best opposing play?

The best rule for making an opening lead, when partner has made an opening bid of no trumps, is to lead your longest and strongest suit, regardless of its top. North's club sequence doubtless makes the best opening lead, with the Q of spades as possible re-entry to again lead clubs, if desirable. North led his fourth-best club, when he should have led the supporting 10, as his partner had bid no trumps. Dummy's 7 forest South's K of clubs. South led back a heart. Declarer's 3 was overtaken with dummy's 8, and the Q of clubs forced South's Ace. West ruffed. Dummy's Q of hearts allowed Ace to enter. The J of clubs was led. The declarer discarded his lowest diamond. At diamond was led. The Q won on a finesse. Trumps were pulled. The defenders had won a single club trick. At the end West had to surrender two spade tricks, but he went game. This was due to the bad opening lead.
