**Cranbrook Netters Edge Culver Squad**

Blue And Gray Close Season With 3 to 2 Victory Over Cadets

The Cranbrook School tennis team closed its season Saturday with a hard fought 3 to 2 victory over the Culver Military Academy team on the latter's courts.

Jim Talgan, Cranbrook number one man, lost the first match, King of Culver by scores of 6-4, 2-6, 7-5. Dick MacDonald was the first Cran winner when he beat Cressman after dropping the first set, the count being 6-6, 6-2, 6-1.

After Elliot of Culver had defaulted because of a bad ankle; Jack Metzger in the third singles match, the Cranbrook doubles team of Talman and MacDonald stepped out to trim King and Swisher in straight sets, 6-3, 6-1. This win clinched the match for the Cranbrook and consequently the victory of the second Culver doubles team of Cressman and Maxwell Metzger and Hargreaves by 2-6, 6-4, 6-4, had no effect on the outcome.

This victory gave the Cranbrook team a percentage of .450 for the 1934 season, since it won three matches, lost four and tied one. The Cranbrook defeated Detroit University School, Howe, and Culver University School, and lost to the Wayne University Freshmen twice, to Cleveland University School, and to Highland Park Junior College. The tie occurred in the first of two matches with Detroit University School.

**Jack Bell To Head Council At Barnum**

Two boys and a girl were chosen to fill the offices of the Barnum Junior High School Student Council at the annual spring election Tuesday. Jack Bell was chosen president; James Todd was elected vice-president, and Constance Peck was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

There were three candidates for the presidency. Besides Bell and Todd, James Conwell ran for the office. Todd, with the second highest number of votes, automatically won the vice-presidency. Francis Paulus was a second candidate for the secretary-treasurer's office.

**Records Fall As Barnum School Wins Track Meet**

The girls' and boys' track teams of Barnum Junior High School won their third leg on the trophy awarded the victor in the annual junior high track and field meet last Friday afternoon at Fered Field. The Barnum teams, which also won the meet in 1932 and 1933, stacked up a total of 84 points to lead their nearest rival, Adams Junior High, by 19 points. Baldwin, the third entry, was a close third, trailing Adams by only one point.

The boys' teams were divided into two divisions. Class A was for boys weighing over 110 pounds, and Class B for boys under 110. The girls' teams competed as one unit in six events.

In the boys' division, seven new records were hung up and one old mark was tied. Four of the new records were made by members of the winning Barnum team.

Class B, Dale Weittel of Barnum added 9 inches to the old broad jump record of 16 feet. In the same event in Class A, Edson McCann of Barnum leaped a half foot farther than anyone had done in the meet before and established a new mark of 18 feet 8 inches. Burt Diemer, another Barnum boy, heaved the shot 42 feet 1 inch to better the old record of 40 feet 7 inches. Barnum also set a new mark in the 410-yard relay race, running the course in 55.7 seconds. Although this mark has been bettered in previous meets, it will stand as the record because the race was run on a grass track for the first time Friday.

The other three records broken were in the Class B high jump when Quentin Brodford of Baldwin jumped 4 feet 10 1/2 inches, 6 1/2 inches higher than the previous best mark; in the Class A high jump, in which Bill Groves of Adams and Don Clark of Baldwin cleared the pole a half inch higher than the old record of 5 feet 3 inches, and in the 200-yard relay, which was won by Adams in 20.5 seconds. The old record was 28.1 seconds.

Assisting DuBois in arranging the party are Shirley Roofnagle, who has charge of the decorations; Frank Savage, in charge of the program, and Dean Beier, chairman of the orchestra committee.
