Bridegroom Hurt in Crash, Wedding Goes Right On

Although he almost fainted from injuries received in an automobile accident which occurred here only a short time before the ceremony, Harry Hilton, caddy master at Oakland Hills Country Club, went through with his scheduled wedding at 10 A. M. Saturday in Grace Reformed Church, Detroit.

While hurrying to join his bride-to-be, Miss Mary Fredericks, of 15521 Justine street, Detroit, before going to the church, Hilton's automobile collided with another, driven by Helen Mau, 18 years old, of 2161 West Lincoln avenue, Birmingham. The crash, in which both cars were completely wrecked, occurred on West Maple avenue at Glenzary road, in Bloomfield Hills.

Hilton suffered deep cuts on his arm and ear, and a badly bruised shoulder. He was taken to the office of Dr. C. F. Lawler here, but after the operations were sewed up he burst into a wedding.

In order not to alarm his bride, Hilton told her he had cut his ear while shaving, but when he grew pale and nearly fainted during the ceremony, he was forced to give her the details of the accident. After the wedding, both Hilton and his bride hurried back to Dr. Lawler's office, where X-rays of the shoulder were taken. They showed a broken bone, but no broken bones, Dr. Lawler said.

Miss Mau was treated by Dr. O. Beck for cuts on the head and leg. The crash occurred, it is said, when Miss Mau, driving her Maple road, attempted to pass an ice truck and collided head-on with Hilton, who was travelling east.

Hilton was driving a car owned by Al Watrous, golf professional at Oakland Hills.

6,000 AT ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING

Harvard University Professor Is Named President For Christian Scientists For 1934-35

With 6,000 members from all parts of the world in attendance, the annual meeting of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., opened Monday afternoon. Dr. John M. Brewer, associate professor of education at Harvard University, was elected president of the church for the coming year. In his presidential address, Dr. Brewer pointed out three ways by which Christian Scientists can help humanity to get along peacefully and harmoniously with each other in family, community, state, nation and world.

"First," he said, "we can continue and improve our work of healing the sick and suffering. In the second place, we can contribute to the cause of democratic government and place our influence and power by supporting the good in human affairs and rejecting the impracticable, unwise, extravagant, and evil. The third great agency for contributing to good government lies in our own relationships with our fellow men. Here we can show just what human government may become when man is governed by God."

Reports presented hailed the completion of the new publishing house of the Christian Science Publishing Society, now in full use as the home of the Christian Science Monitor and other church publications.

A marked increase in the demand for the published writings of Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy was reported. It was stated that, for the first time, official lectures on Christian Science have been given in such distant fields as Macassar, Cebu, Manila, Ceylon, Surabaya, Java, and other remote places.

There are now 3,673 Christian Science branch churches and societies, 67 new organizations having been added during the year, it was reported. The number of registered practitioners of Christian Science is 107,755, a gain of 682. During the year the churches furnished funds and other relief in stricken areas in times of flood and disaster, and took part in employment relief in Boston.

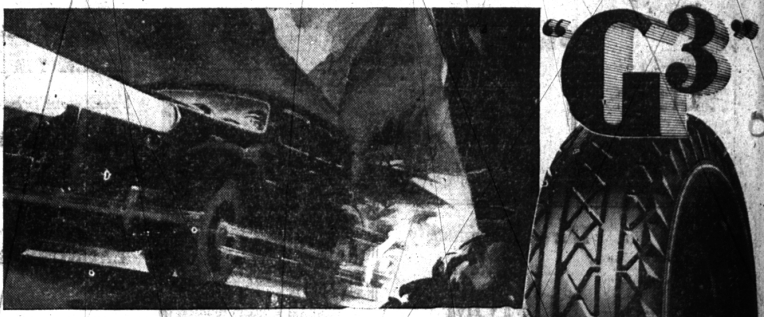
