

ERRORS BEAT B. A. C. TEAM

Locals Commit 11 Misplay And Lose To Unique Press, 15-12

Unable to hold onto its lead in the last four innings, the Birmingham Athletic club baseball team dropped a loosely played game to the Unique Press nine of Detroit Sunday on the East Maple avenue diamond here, 15 to 12.

Tony Schultz, who started on the mound for the B. A. C., fanned the going rough; and was nicked for 12 hits and 14 runs in the seven innings he pitched. Even at that, his teammates hit the ball hard enough to keep him in the lead for four innings, tied up the count again in the fifth after the visitors had scored three runs, and dropped behind only when the Detroiters added another in the sixth.

Donald Joy finished the game in the box for Birmingham, allowing one hit and one run in the last two innings. But the B. A. C. never was in the lead after the fourth frame, and not even in the tie after the fifth, and it is likely that the most effective pitching in the world would have gone largely to waste in the epidemic of errors committed by the local team. The B. A. C. was guilty of 11 misplays in the field. That was only three more than Unique Press made, but it was enough more to lose the ball game, especially when B. A. C. was unable to collect only 10 hits to the opponents' 13.

CRANBROOK TRACK MEN LOSE FINALE

Western Reserve Academy Team, 72 to 50, in Season's Last Meet

Western Reserve Academy of Hudson, O., proved to have slightly the better track team in a meet with Cranbrook School Saturday, as the Crane triumphed convincingly on the short end of a 72 to 50 score. This was the final meet of the year for Cranbrook, and left the team with a record of three wins and three defeats.

In the Western Reserve meet the Academy men counted most heavily in the dashes and distances, while the Cranes were strongest in the hurdles and jumps. Reserve took nine firsts to five for the Blue and Gray. Thum of the former team was high point man, with three firsts and a share in the relay for a total of 16 1/2. Jim Beckard was the high scorer for the Cranes, getting eight points on a first, a second, and a third.

Bob Eddy, star Cranbrook miler, succeeded in lowering his own record for the second time this year, running the distance in 4:40.8, seven seconds under his previous mark. Eddy finished in a virtual tie with Winkler of Western Reserve, but was given only second place when his opponent collapsed at the finish line and broke the tape in falling.
