FIVE-ODD AT DIAMONDS

IN A RECENT duplicate game in Velasco Tex., Robert Powell was the only player who both bid and made 5 diamonds on the South hand. The opening lead is the K of spades.

Now West must lead clubs up to the declarer, and South will

make his 5-odd. South can go game in another way. He need not ruff the lead from dummy. He can give West a trump trick. South can ruff a spade lead, then lead a low club through West, giving him a club trick, but South will go game.

If West ruffs the last heart led from dummy, the declarer will be able to ruff both spades held by West, and have to give that player only one club trick.

If West discards a club, instead of ruffing the last heart led from dummy, the Ace of clubs will pick up one of his honors, and West will win one club and one trump trick. He cannot prevent South from going game.

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
