

BOYS ATTENDING DINNER

Booth Describes Perfect Father-Son Relationship At Community Banquet

Nearly 300 boys and their companions assembled at a Father and Son Banquet in the Community House at Thursday night, also together, together, sang together and applauded together an inspirational message by Charles Brum Booth, national extension secretary of the Volunteers of America.

The banquet was a community dinner sponsored by the Y. M. C. Following the dinner and a program of varied entertainment and while the younger boys were shown moving pictures in the basement, the older boys and their fathers listened to Mr. Booth's conception of the perfect father-son relationship as one in which the spirit of give and take is the same on both sides, resulting in a genuinely co-operative partnership.

"It's a partnership," Mr. Booth declared, "in which not only the father says, 'Yes, son, I need you,' but the son says, 'Yes, dad, I need you.' It's a partnership in which we need each other."

A close and intimate understanding of the father by the son, as well as of the son by his father, is needed to bring out the finest qualities of each, the speaker stated. He recommended that certain days should be set aside for the purpose of cultivating understanding, days on which nothing else should be allowed to interfere with the development of partnership.

Nothing, he said, has been so important to the world in the past, and is so important today, as the development of high character in men and boys.

"The thing that stands out above all else is the fitness of the man and the fitness of the boy," he declared, adding that health, fine homes, successful business and all else fade into insignificance in comparison with men who have made fine, outstanding, sacrificial services.

City Manager James W. Parry was the toastmaster. Harry McDonald of Detroit led the group in community singing as well as offering a group of vocal solos. A ventriloquist act by Rickerson and a demonstration in magic by Clarence Cummings amused the fathers as well as the boys. Music during the dinner was furnished by Klime's Orchestra.

Mr. Morse Cooke, principal of the Community School, was general chairman of the banquet committee.
