Schwarze, McBride Lead
Baldwin To Easy Win
Over Ferndale Cagers

WITH THE team's victory over the Maroons last night, Fred Schwarze and Kenneth McBride, clicking better than they had done all season, the Maroons sold White of Baldwin High School was hung high and wide in victory Friday evening on the Baldwin court when the Maples marched to an easy 31 to 23 win over the cagers from Lincoln High School of Ferndale in their last home game of the season.

The Maroons, who had performed unsatisfactorily in their last three games, were back in form again and played a superior brand of ball. Friday night was an opportune time for comeback for the Maroons who have only one more game to play before they enter the state tournament at East Detroit, Mar. 8.

With both Schwarze and McBride playing good ball, the whole team displayed more ability than it has for some time. The Baldwin forwards, who accounted for 25 of the 31 Maple points, made several beautiful one-arm and overhead shots that kept Friday night's game from dropping through. Schwarze opened the scoring on a free throw. When Dick Merchant, Ferndale guard, scored the first field goal, a long shot from mid-court, and sent his team into a one-point lead, 2 to 1, the Maplesitters stood on the top of the score for the first and last time. The first period ended with the Maples at double points ahead, 14 to 2, and at half time the score stood 19 to 8.

Only two other players, Bob Mix, Baldwin center who found the hoop for two field goals in the first half, and Chuck Forester, substitute guard, who netted a short pop-shot for the Maple's last tally of the game, aided Schwarze and McBride in the scoring.

Only in the last period, after Coach Franklyn Whitney had placed four reserves on the floor, did the Lincoln team outscore the Maples. In this frame the Maples counted only four points as compared with seven for Lincoln.

Last week Principal Melvin C. Hart procured the names of all of the club's officers, and in the near future he hopes to meet with these officials and have a talk with them.

"I have no idea what their reaction will be to what I have to say," the principal said, "but I do want to hear their side of the problem and undoubtedly they will have some good points to bring out."

According to Franklyn Whitney, Baldwin basketball coach, the rumors going around to the effect that he was trying to get officials to permit the school to win a quarter to play its regional playoffs before the state tournament at East Detroit, as it had been assigned to do, are entirely untrue.

Coach Whitney said he was disappointed when he learned that his team was to play at East Detroit instead of Fordson because he was under the impression that the East Detroit gym was quite small and rather old. He has discovered since that the Halfway school has a new case and he is entirely satisfied. Last season the Baldwin outfit was assigned first place in the Fordson division, and at the last minute was transferred to Fordson where it was put out of the playoffs by River Ruce in its first game.

The East Detroit drawing will be held Saturday. As yet Whitney has received no word as to what schools Baldwin will compete against.

Does Joe O'Conner have to drive home a load of girls every week? Don Donaldson, Baldwin High school track star, won three of 11 nominations listed on the ballot in a mock election in the senior session room last week. He carried the most votes as room sweeper, best spotter, and the boy with the best line. Bob Harris was next on the list, being named as the room phonograph and the best talker.

Others "elected" were Beatrice Pemberthy, gum-chewer; Carol Dweley, lady of leisure; Peg Mills, most enthusiastic; Jack Sager, class pet; Rex Oberbeck, class skeleton; Kenneth McBride, best natured, and Fred Schwarze, teacher's pet.

Unless something unexpected develops in the line of new material, Baldwin's chances of repeating its marvelous track record of last year, when it won the State Class B championship, are pretty slim. Only two lettersmen from last season's team are eligible to compete. They are Don Donaldson, dash man, and Frank Becker, high jumper and long distance runner. Donaldson was impressive last season, but he will have a hard job ahead of him to fill the flying shoes of Bill Guckelberg, who finished first in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes in the state meet last spring.

Beasecker has possibilities but, he, too, will be hard pressed to take the places of his two predecessors, Rex Oberbeck who in the Royal Oak meet last year broke the state high jump record and who led first place in this event in the state meet, and Clayton Brelesford winner of blue ribbon honors all last season for the Maroons in the half mile.

Two boys who pole vaulted for Baldwin last year but were not letter winners are also candidates this season. They are Harold Minting and Cliff McBride. Ted McCutcheon, 440-yard dash man, another member of last year's club, is also expected to report.

Of the green material, little is known. One of the candidates, Bob Savage, who ran on the Baldwin relay team which won first place in the indoor meet at Ann Arbor last month, will probably be one of the dash men.

On a whole chance of winning another state championship or even a first place in the regional meet, look scarce. Coach Whitney has to mould a bunch of inexperienced boys into a track team and it is too much to hope that they will duplicate last year's record.

**CRANES DEFEATED
BY CULVER CAGERS**

Cadets Score First And Keep Lead Throughout, Winning By 31 to 18

A fast and smooth functioning basketball team from Culver Military Academy defeated the Cranbrook School quintet on the latter's floor Saturday night by a count of 31 to 18, the identical score by which the Cranes lost to the Wayne University Freshmen two weeks ago.

The Culver five scored on a close-up shot by Bevin, leader of the cadet attack, and never relinquished its lead. The Cranbrook offense started slowly and was strongest in the second period when the Blue and Gray fought to within two points of tying the score. The cadets ended the first half with a rush, however, and were on the long end of a 14 to 9 count at the whistle.

In the third and fourth quarters the Culver team continued to dominate the play and to gradually increase its lead until the end of the game. As in the second period, the Cranes started a rally but were stopped by the superior work of the cadets.

Bevin was high scorer with six field goals for a total of 12 points, and Bill James of Cranbrook was runner-up with three field goals and the same number of free throws for nine points.

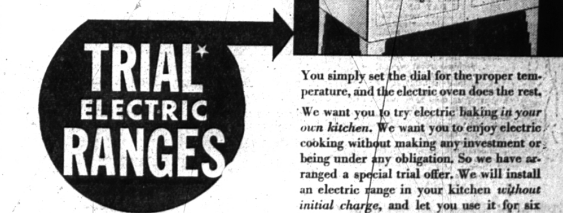
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
