Retarded Children Make Good Later, Report Shows

Under the direction of Dr. Adolf Meyer, professor of psychiatry at Johns Hopkins University a survey was made in 1914 of the school children of Lucas Point, Md. There were 1,282 children of school age in Lucas Point, of whom 166 were found to be retarded. [Twenty-two of these (from nine to 14 years of age) were so low that they could neither read, write nor run errands.]

Mr. Mac Fie Campbell, another Johns Hopkins psychiatrist, said of them, that they could be self-supporting, and were liable to fill the ranks of vagrants, alcoholics and delinquents.

Sixty-three more, from seven to 14, were labeled as life-long dependents, and the other 59 as having very doubtful future.

Sympathetic Teacher
All these children were taught or generally guided by one Hannah Dorritze, not very strong on academic credits, but long on human sympathy and interest.

What about these same children in 1930? They and their homes were checked and the places where they worked. Of the 166 backward children, 120 were found (11 were dead, 13 had moved away). Some were delinquent? Yes, but only 10 per cent higher than for an equal number of children with average intelligence. About one-half were

working in the factories, railroads, shipyards; 95 per cent were self-supporting; five others were until the depression.

Who about the 22 classified by the psychiatrist as hopeless in 1914? Eight were self-supporting in 1930. Four of the girls were well married, while only five of the 22 had help from their families or the community. One boy of the group, with a family history of feebleness and immorality, is now a responsible inspector with an insurance company. One girl is a mother of three children, member of a woman's club and an active P. A. worker living in a home owned by her and her husband, and they have savings.

Majority Married
Of the 72 boys and 50 girls, 48 boys and 48 girls are married. The homes of 37 of the couples are owned or being paid for; 19 have bank accounts, and most of the 96 are comfortable and modernly equipped.

Such are some of the facts presented in a fascinating article by Genevieve Parkhurst, in the January issue of a leading magazine.

One thing more. What about the children of these 96 married couples of the 1914 group? I quote the answer by Miss Parkhurst: "Of the 96 married couples, 75 have a total of 173 children, 79 of whom are of school age. Among 64 whose mentalities were tested, only three are subnormal. Four have a superior intelligence. Seven are entirely normal. While the mental with their years, their responses are of the others have kept pace are not quite up to those of the average child.
