

POINTS TO NEW U. S. FRONTIERS

Educator Says Challenge To American Pioneer Spirit Is Greater Than Ever

The American people have more and wider frontiers to explore today than at any other time in the nation's history, according to Prof. Charles True Goodell, acting president of Kalamazoo College, who spoke at the First Baptist Church Sunday morning. Possession of the real pioneer spirit has been the chief cause for greatness in the American people, he declared, adding that although our physical frontier was closed in 1890, leaving no longer any opportunity for mere geographical exploration, the appearance of new spiritual, intellectual and social frontiers has continued the challenge to that pioneer spirit.

The cultural and educational frontier, he asserted, is one that can never be fully conquered. It is a vast frontier of books and study, requiring the utmost discrimination from the pioneer to prevent him from spending valuable time on that which is not worthy.

The frontier of social life probably calls for more courage than any other, the speaker said. "We are facing today the turning point in history," he declared. "Even the democratic system of government in the United States is being carried out by President Roosevelt in one of the greatest social and economic experiments ever attempted. It is a revolutionary movement and is naturally being criticized and feared, but the true pioneer accepts the challenge it offers."

"We have not even begun to explore all the possibilities of the frontier of religion, Professor Goodell said. One of these possibilities, he said, is that of a complete church union.

"There are too many communities in which 200 or 300 people are divided among six churches," he said. "The religious frontier is not one to be afraid of. It is one to be explored in the spirit of the pioneer. Frontiers may serve either as

barriers or challenges to develop our progressive spirit, he declared. They make us either cowards or great men. On the one hand is destructive radicalism, and on the other is static conservatism. In between is the progressive, like President Roosevelt, making steady advances along new frontiers, in the spirit of the true pioneer."

YPSI ORCHESTRA TRIUMPHS AGAIN

Normal Symphony And Two Soloists Score In Methodist Church Concert

Marius Fossenkemper and his Ypsilanti Normal Symphony Orchestra, conquered another Birmingham audience with their concert in the First Methodist Church Friday evening.

Although the auditorium in which they played is not acoustically fitted for such a large organization, and their stage quarters were cramped as well, these young musicians played with the same vigor and understanding which stamped them at their first Birmingham concert last year as one of the outstanding student orchestras of the country.

The chief honors for the evening, however, fell to Emily Muter Adams, the orchestra's youthful concert mistress, who won a sustained ovation for her performance of the brilliant "Symphonie Espagnole" of Lalo. In this work she revealed a full tone of smooth, even quality which, combined with an agile left hand and right wrist that were equal to the challenge of every technical difficulty amply expressed by the audience in vociferous and prolonged applause.

Only slightly less enthusiastically received was Carl Lindgren, basso, who sang two numbers, the lyric "O Tu Palermo" from Verdi's "I Vespri Siciliani," and Darnroch's dramatic "Danny Deever" in the finished style and pleasing voice which has won him favor with audiences throughout the country.

The orchestra's contributions to the program were of pleasing variety, attesting to the versatility of both players and conductor. They included Goussu's "Mirvelli" overture and the ballet music from the same composer's "Faust"; a Strauss waltz, "Tales from the Vienna Woods," and Kalman's "Couness Maritza."—A. T.
