Former Resident Of Birmingham To Wed Pontiac Man In Detroit

Birmingham friends will be interested in an announcement by Mrs. Antoinette Patenaude Montgomery of Detroit, formerly of Birmingham, of her approaching marriage on April 14 to Henry Holdridge Watchpocket, son of John Watchpocket of Watkins Lake, Pontiac. Mrs. Montgomery is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chauncey M. Goodrich of Windsor, Ont.

The ceremony will be performed in the Pilgrim Chapel of the North Woodward Congregational Church in Detroit, at 7:30 o'clock. Miss Margot Goodrich will serve as her sister's only attendant, and Douglas H. Haynes of Elizabeth Lake will assist Mr. Watchpocket as best man.

A dinner for members of the bridal party and members of the family will be held at the Ingleside Club following the ceremony. Mrs. Montgomery was a resident of Birmingham for 16 years until last June, when she moved to Detroit. Mr. Watchpocket is a graduate of Pontiac High School and of Harvard University.

Open Hunt Reveals Date Of Annual Indoor Meet

The schedule of events for the annual indoor horse show of the Bloomfield Open Hunt to be held Saturday, Mar. 31, at the club was announced yesterday by Charles D. Pierce, chairman of the show committee.

The President's Cup, donated by Bernard E. Hopper, will be presented to the horse or pony winning the highest number of points. The show will start promptly at 2 P. M., with the children's horse-manship class for contestants under 12 years of age as the first event. In this event, horsemanship only will count. The same will be true of the second event, the horsemanship class for children 12 years old or more.

The junior jump over fences not to exceed 3 feet 6 inches in height will be the third event. This will be followed by the parent and junior jump, which will be taken abreast over six jumps, also 3 feet 6 inches high.

The parent and junior saddle class, to be shown at a walk, trot and canter, the open jump over fences 4 feet high, and the gentlemen's and ladies' hack classes, also to be shown at a walk, trot and canter, are subsequent events on the schedule.

Three classes are for hunters. The first of these is open to six-year-olds and under. They will be shown over six fences, each 3 1/2 feet high. Lightweight hunters will be exhibited in an event with six fences 4 feet high. Middle and heavyweight hunters will be shown in their own class in a jump over the same number of fences, also to be 4 feet high.

Afternoon tea will be a social feature of the show. The closing date for entries is Thursday, March 29.
