SCIENCE, BIBLE CANNOT AGREE
 They Can't Be Measured By Standard Unit, Extension Head Declares
 Science and the Bible can never agree because they are two entirely different things and there is no fundamental basis of measurement which can be applied to each.
 This was the theme of a highly entertaining talk delivered at a dinner meeting of the Men's Club of St. James' Episcopal Church Tuesday evening by Dr. W. D. Henderson, for several years professor of physics at the University of Michigan and now head of the University's extension division.
 "The Bible is the chronicle of a people who had a genius for coming into contact with God," he said.

Cantata To Be Sung By St. James' Choir
 Waldo Follows To Direct 25 Voices In Buck's "Story Of The Cross"
 The Lenten cantata, "The Story of the Cross," by Dudley Buck, will be presented by the choir of St. James' Episcopal Church at 8 o'clock on the evening of Good Friday, Mar. 30.
 The cantata is one of the better known works of the eminent American composer who was for many years organist of the Church of the Holy Trinity at Brooklyn, N. Y. Beginning with the scene of Christ Before Pilate, the musical theme traces the story through the series of events culminating in the crucifixion.
 The choir, numbering 25 voices, will be directed by Waldo E. Fellows, with Mrs. Ethel Roy Dudley at the organ. Incidental solos will be sung by Mrs. T. Melbourne Roberts, Mrs. James Lee Oliver, Mrs. C. E. Doane, Charles Hutton, Laurence P. Smith and Mr. Fellows.
 There will be no admission charge.

Constant Change
 So many statements which previously had been considered incontrovertible in science have, in recent years, been proved false that science has undergone a constant change, he pointed out. The Bible, making no pretensions to exactitude, is not subject to this shifting process.
 "I've been banged on the head, scientifically, so many times that I'm being a little cautious now," he said. "No longer do I stand in front of my students and say there is anything that can't be done," recalling the time, not long ago, when professors told their students the atom could not be divided.
 "Yet," he added, "if we found somewhere in the Bible today the statement that you can't break an electron up, where would we be tomorrow if somebody came along and actually did break one up?"
Function of Bible
 The primary functions of the writers whose works are collected in the Bible, he said, was to translate a picture of God to man, and to open a medium through which the spirit they felt could be carried over to others. The function of science is entirely different—to give a rational explanation of the universe in terms of our known experience.
 Dr. Henderson prefaced his remarks on science and the Bible with a picture of the modern world being subjected to the greatest time rate of change in history.
 "More things can happen now in 24 hours than used to happen in 24 years," he said. "I don't believe we're going back to the 'good old days,' but I believe we're going to see a great many more changes in the next 10 years. Whether they will bring us to chaos or cosmos I don't know, but it will be one or the other."
