## SECURITY LIES ONLY IN PEACE

Best Patriots of Work to Prevent All War, Mrs. Shain Asserts

So now, what is there new to be said in conclusion? When all the war whoops have been shouted and the news wars fought, will not those who are left, if any, be starting at a new point again? There is an old story which I still believe when we come of age we will get rid of these infantile attitudes. Women in the hundreds of thousands could effectually prevent wars. Every country on earth has felt the impact of women's causes in the last 25 years, and not many have failed. ## The World At A Glance

### Administration Losing Ground Does Not Desire To Use Force Price Rise Presents Problem

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—The Roosevelt administration has lost considerable ground the past few weeks—at least, in Washington. The St. Lawrence treaty defeat was an incident. It plays no part in the larger picture. The ground lost concerns labor, industry, and a greater degree than realized, has refused to be "dictated" to—the administration refuses to respond to "force" at least, so far. There should be no mistake, the President has the power. President Roosevelt manifestly is eager to please all groups. He is anxious to avoid any odium of dictatorship. In this meaning, however, his sub-issues, such as General Johnson of the NRA, merely exhort and denounce. The St. Lawrence treaty decision that the President will remain conciliatory and "middle of the road." All the plans will collapse unless he can persuade industry to continue to look ahead, to develop, to produce more and more jobs. He could readily force corporations to comply with codes—but he could not force them to continue operations, unless the Government took over industry "in the common good."

## TENTATIVE COUNTY BUDGET ADOPTED

Board Of Supervisors Accepts Ways And Means Committee's 1935 Figure Of \$459,000

A tentative budget of \$459,131.12 for 1935 was adopted last Thursday by the Oakland County Board of Supervisors by a vote of 38 to 8. The supervisors had previously voted down a \$799,425 budget recommended by the County Board of Auditors, 40 to 7. The figure adopted had been submitted by the ways and means committee, and is practically the same as that for 1934.

## FIRE EXTINGUISHER SERVICE, CONSIDERED

City Manager James W. Barry is investigating today the advisability of establishing a systematic municipal fire extinguisher service, following a suggestion made at the Commission meeting Monday night by Commissioner Arthur J. Brandt.

The system would entail the refilling by the city fire department of privately owned fire extinguishers at regular intervals. The service would be available to any person desiring it at the fee specified. At present, the city refills at cost any extinguisher which is brought to the fire department, but makes no attempt to provide this service if it is not solicited.
