**City officials were still in the dark yesterday regarding details of the new Wage Work plan which is to replace the CWA program, supposedly on April 1.**  
The city was originally ordered to cease work on its three CWA projects last night, but a later order has extended it until at least Saturday night. City Manager James W. Parry said yesterday.

He feared this might be the case, he said, from information which indicated that the department will pay only wages in the new system, and that individual municipalities will have to assume the cost of all materials and supervisory staff.

He expressed a doubt that the city could afford to pay for supervisory materials for the uncompleted CWA projects have all been purchased. He said he was not familiar with the details of the proposed plan to file applications for funds.

Work on the Birmingham school repair project is also scheduled to be completed by the end of the month. He said he was hopeful the Wage Work program, inasmuch as virtually all of the materials have either been purchased or ordered under the CWA.
