SCHOOL SITUATION THEME OF TALKS

Education Will Discuss Present Problems From Legislative Point Of View

Important aspects of the present school situation will be discussed in the light of state legislation by Charles W. Crandell, superintendent of Birmingham schools, and E. J. Lederle, county school commissioner, at a meeting of the Birmingham League of Women Voters in the Community House Monday afternoon. Another subject to be considered is the "Reorganization of County Government," on which Mrs. John A. Venn, legislative chairman of the Wayne County League, will speak.

Prior to the meeting there will be a luncheon at the home of Mrs. W. Dale Weitzel will be in charge of arrangements. The meeting will be open to the public.

Mr. Crandell will speak on "State Aid for Education," referring particularly to Act 236, which was passed by the 57th Legislature. Mr. Crandell will deal specifically with the manner in which this Act affects the school situation in Birmingham.

"The Reorganization of Schools on a County-Unit Basis" is the subject on which Mr. Lederle will address the League, using as an explanation of the plan House Bill No. 44. Although this bill failed to pass in the last special session of the Legislature, Mr. Lederle will discuss the county-unit basis for reorganization in the light of possible future legislation.

Mrs. Venn will speak on county government reorganization as a topic to which the League has devoted considerable study.


