

DEATH TAKES OLD RESIDENT

Services Held Monday For John McCarroll, 82, Victim Of Stroke

Instructions he wrote down before his death were carried out Monday afternoon, in funeral services for John McCarroll, 82 years old, who died last Friday morning at his home, 431 Park street, where he lived with his daughter, Mary Margaret.

The services were held from the O. Wylie Bell Funeral Home, with burial in Southfield cemetery. The Rev. Dr. R. D. Hopkins, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiated at the funeral services.

Mr. McCarroll had been an active member for 25 years, officiated by the Rev. J. C. Matthews of the Reformed Presbyterian Church offered the prayer, and the Rev. Julian S. West, a former pastor, gave the address.

Mr. McCarroll had been ill only since the preceding Sunday, when he suffered a stroke. He leaves besides his daughter, four brothers, the Rev. Hugh of Los Angeles, Dr. James of Denver, the Rev. Walter of New York City, and Dr. Calvin of Ann Arbor.

The eldest son of George and Margaret McCarroll, he was born on the family homestead, located 12 miles west of Birmingham and 3 1/2 miles northeast of Wallis Lake, on Sept. 17, 1851, remaining there until he was 26 years of age.

He was married Feb. 14, 1878, to Mary Ann McCarroll of Belfast, Ireland, at the home of her brother, William McCarroll, in Brooklyn, N. Y. Shortly after the marriage she died, and he lived for five years, then sold and bought another farm in Southfield, where he lived for five miles southwest of Birmingham, where he lived for 17 years. There his two daughters were born to them, the two youngest dying in infancy.

In 1920, the family moved to Flint. Mrs. McCarroll died Sept. 19, 1907, while on a visit with a cousin, and the father and daughter returned to Birmingham in May, 1909. They have lived at the

Death Takes Mrs. Elizabeth Edwards, For Whose Son Legion Post Here Was Named

The Rev. Bates Burt, rector of the Saints' Episcopal Church, Pontiac, officiated at funeral services held from the S. O. Wylie Bell Funeral Home, Wednesday afternoon for Mrs. Elizabeth Edwards, a Gold Star mother for whose son the Charles Edwards Post of the American Legion here was named. Burial was in Roseland Park cemetery.

Mrs. Edwards, who was 80 years old, died Sunday morning at her home, 377 North Johnson street, Pontiac, where she had lived for the past seven months. She had moved to Pontiac from Birmingham, after residing here 47 years. She was a charter member of St. James' Episcopal Church here and of the American Legion Auxiliary. She was born in England. She leaves two sons, William T. of Clarkston and George E. of Pontiac; two daughters, Mrs. Anna Milton of Holly and Mrs. Lillian Cook of Birmingham; a niece, Mrs. Anna Durston of Somersetshire, England; 11 grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

Her son, Charles, died while serving with the A. E. F. in France in 1918. The American Legion Post which honored him in its name was founded here in the following year.


