CRANBROOK COURT FIVE DROPS FINALE Holds Western Reserve Academy On Even Terms For Three Quarters, Then Leads Cranbrook School's basketball team met defeat in its final game of the 1934 season at the hands of the Western Reserve Academy quintet of Hudson, O., Saturday afternoon in Cranbrook's gymnasium with a score of 26 to 22. The Cranes made a valiant fight for three periods and the score was tied at 19 to 19 as the fourth quarter opened. Then Cranbrook weakened and allowed the Reserve men to pull ahead rapidly. Even then the Blue and Gray rallied in the last few seconds and gave the Ohioans a scare by getting to within three points of the lead and making several last-minute shots that barely missed the hoop. Joe Wells, Academy forward, was high point man with four field goals and three charity shots for a total of 11, while Pattengill and MacDonald of Cranbrook and Wilson of Reserve were tied for second place with five counters apiece.

Cranbrook Makes Awards In 3 Sports Varsity Letters Granted To Eight In Basketball, 12 In Wrestling Athletic awards for winter sports were announced at Cranbrook School Monday afternoon, following a meeting of the Athletic Awards Committee at which the granting of letters and numerals for respect in hockey and wrestling was decided upon. A disappointing season in basketball accounts for the fact that only eight letters were awarded in that sport. They went to Foster, James, Keppel, Lippincott, MacDonough, Metzger, Pattengill, and Sealey. Letters in hockey were won by 13 players, after a long and successful season. They were Beaudette, Blunt, L. Craig, R. Craig, Reddy, Gilray, Jones, Lerchen, Packard, Page, Talman, Thompson and Werken. Wrestling was a comparatively new sport at Cranbrook this year, having been revived under the coaching of Ed C. Johnson. The squad did exceptionally well in all its meets and its continuance at Cranbrook is assured. Twelve men receiving letters in the sport were Anderson, Bird, Clement, Craig, J. Gilray, Hinshaw, Judson, Lovett, McDonnell, Osburn, and Robinson.

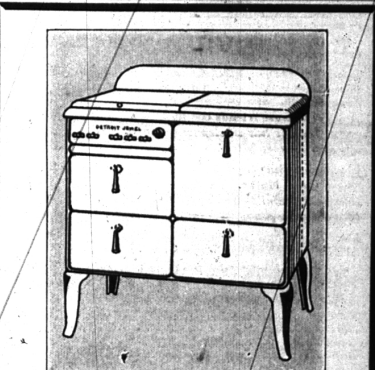
