### RULES LAID DOWN FOR B. H. S. CLUBS

Fraternities, Sororities Given Six Requirements To Gain Recognition

Letters explaining the rules that will govern whether or not a student organization at Baldwin High School will be recognized by the school and whether it will be considered legal under the state law, were issued this week by Principal Marvin C. Hart to all members of fraternities and sororities. The letters list six requirements to be met by each club. Either the membership must be open to any high school student, or more than 50 per cent of the membership must be drawn from outside the school. Any club with an open membership must elect an advisor from the faculty, and must keep evidences of its pledging and initiation activities away from the school, taking care that at no time the group's conduct will become embarrassing to the school.

Clubs are also asked not to use Greek letters in their names, and have a list for inspection at all times a list of their members.

Mos of the clubs now in existence at the school have already met the majority or all of their requirements, Mr. Hart said.
