DROP THE LOG OF LONE PINE

Bloomfield Commission Told Property Owners Would Block Project

Any possibility that Lone Pine road from Woodward avenue to Cranbrook road might be paved in the near future went glimmering Tuesday night when a letter was read to the Bloomfield Hills Commission declaring that to secure the signatures of persons owning 75 per cent of the abutting property, approving the project, would be "absolutely impossible."

The letter was written by Clarence Booth, one of the property owners who would be included in the special assessment district, and who has been the leader of the most recent movement to have the road paved. On submission of an estimate of the cost of the project by Harry S. Starr, city engineer, Mr. Booth said he interviewed other property owners on the matter and was convinced that the approval of the minimum number required by the charter could not be obtained.

Mr. Starr had estimated the cost at \$34,000, of which not more than 5 per cent could be spread against the city-at-large, nor less than 95 per cent against the special assessment district, under the provisions of the charter. Even if 30 per cent of the total cost could be financed through a PWA grant, a sufficient number of property owners would be opposed to the project to block it, it was indicated, and the Commission abandoned further consideration of the proposal.

Chapter To Honor Past High Priests

100 Masons To Attend Banquet And Program Of Birmingham R. A. M.

Approximately 100 Masons are expected to attend the Past High Priest Night banquet and program to be held in the Masonic Temple Monday evening, when the past high priests of Birmingham Chapter No. 93, R. A. M., will confer the Royal Arch Degrees on a group of three candidates.

Representatives from chapters in Pontiac, Royal Oak, Farmington, Rochester and Orion, which, together with the Birmingham Chapter, recently formed the Oakland County chapter union, will attend, as well as members of chapters from other counties.

Germany Schults, University of Michigan's famous all-time all-American football center, will be the chief speaker at the banquet, which is scheduled to begin at 6:30 P. M. Other talks will be given by William R. Brown, past commander-in-chief of the Detroit Sovereign Consistory, and Orrin G. Bickford, grand high priest of the grand chapter of Michigan.

Stanley Treadwell, high priest of the Birmingham Chapter, will be the toastmaster.

HEADQUARTERS PICKED FOR POPPY DAY SALE

A vacant store on West Maple avenue, in the Hanna Building, will be the headquarters for the annual Poppy Day Sale of the American Legion here May 26, it has been announced by Mrs. Gordon L. Bailey, general chairman. "The purpose of Poppy Day is to give everyone an opportunity to pay individual tribute to the men who gave their lives in defense of the nation," Mrs. Bailey said. "The little act of wearing the poppy touches the individual more closely than large public ceremonies in which he is only a spectator and awakens a realization of the individual responsibility to the nation, so greatly needed at this time."

COAL TRUCK DRIVERS' RACE ENDS IN COURT

Two coal truck drivers staged a race on Woodward avenue Monday night, but a Bloomfield Hills police car overtook both of them, and they were arrested.

One of the drivers, Harry D. Ritchey, 40 years old, of 2741 Wreford avenue, Detroit, refused to stop, police said, at their first sight. He was charged with driving under the influence of liquor and fined \$50.

The other, Clarence Peters, 26, of 7255 Hartwell avenue, Dearborn, obeyed the command to stop, but was fined \$25 for reckless driving and failure to carry tail lights on his truck.
