**TORCH CLUB WILL VISIT CRANBROOK**

**Public Invited To Join Convention Delegates At Lecture On Eclipses**

Delegates to the 10th anniversary convention of the International Association of Torch Clubs, in progress during the latter half of this week in Detroit, will visit Cranbrook institutions Friday afternoon, dine at Cranbrook School, and share with the public a motion picture journey through the skies Friday evening at Cranbrook School Auditorium.

Under the auspices of Cranbrook Institute of Science, and with the co-operation of the department of astronomy at the University of Michigan, Dr. Heber D. Curtis, director of the University observatory, is the guest trustee of the Institute, will address the evening audience on "Solar Eclipses, and a Journey to the Moon." The illustrative motion pictures are among the modern marvels of astronomy, and are the results of the experiments and inventions developed by Francis A. and Robert McMath and Judge Henry S. Hulbert, in the McMath-Hulbert Observatory at Lake Angelus, which they recently presented to the University.

The achievement of these, the first successful motion pictures of solar and lunar eclipses and other phenomena, won for the three amateur scientists, all of whom are trustees of Cranbrook Institute of Science) the Wetherill prize awarded by the Franklin Institute of Philadelphia. The public is invited to the lecture, and no admission fee will be charged.

Torch Clubs, which exist in 25 cities, confine their membership to 21 recognized professions, and their objects are "to prevent the narrowing tendencies of specialization by developing a breadth of thought and culture, and to foster the highest standards of professional ethics and civic well-being." The national president is Judge Arthur Wolster of the Wayne County Circuit Court, Lee A. White, of Birmingham, is president of the Detroit Torch Club.

**METHODISTS ENDORSE DECECY MOVEMENT**

The First Methodist Church of Birmingham is on record today as being in sympathy with the nationwide movement sponsored by the Catholic churches of America to ban indecency from motion pictures by refusing to patronize pictures showing films in which immorality and obscenity is displayed.

At a recent meeting of the official board, a resolution was passed unanimously instructing the secretary to recommend to the bishop and district superintendent that the Methodist denomination endorse the movement. Every organization in the church is represented on the board.

Approximately 5000 members of the congregation of Holy Name Church here signed the pledge of the League of Decency against immorality in motion pictures May 6.
