

CRANE TRACKMEN SWAMP VISITORS

Nichols Of Buffalo Falls Third Victim Of Blue And Gray, 90 1/2 To 30 1/2

Nichols School of Buffalo was the victim of the Cranbrook School track team's third victory out of four meets this season, losing to the Cranes last Saturday at Cranbrook by the overwhelming score of 90 1/2 to 30 1/2.

Bob Gilray was high point man for the Blue and Gray with a total of 19 counters scored on three first places, a second, and a third. He also accounted for one of two new Cranbrook records by running the low hurdles in 13.6 the other record being a leap of 5 feet 9 inches by Jack Lovett in the high jump.

Cranbrook scored a total of 10 first places to four for the Nichols team, and in eight events the Crane men registered slams. Cranbrook was far superior in the weights, jumps, and hurdles, while Nichols won nearly all of the dash events.

'INDIFFERENCE' OF CHURCH ASSAILED

W. I. L. P. Secretary Says Christianity Often Overlooks 'Covert Violence'

Because it too often recognizes and tolerates two distinct sets of morals, one for the individual and another for society, the Christian Church too often remains inexcusably indifferent to wrongs committed by large groups—especially war—and thereby betrays the broad humanitarian and brotherly principles of Jesus Christ.

This indictment of organized Christianity was the theme of a sermon preached at St. James' Episcopal Church Sunday morning by Dorothy Detzer, of Washington, D. C., executive secretary of the United States section of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom.

Miss Detzer was the first of a group of visiting lay speakers and clergymen who will occupy the pulpit at St. James' during the absence of the Rev. Warner L. Forsyth, who is in Arkansas for his health. The speaker next Sunday will be Ralph L. Lee, a newcomer to Birmingham, who has taken orders in the Episcopal Church but retired from the ministry to enter business. He will be followed on the succeeding Sunday by Malcolm W. Bingray, editorial director of the Detroit Free Press.

"The church as a whole is indifferent, to certain types of violence," Miss Detzer declared. "It recognizes a personal morality which says that it is wrong for an individual to lie, steal and kill, but it says little or nothing about the morality of a society which sometimes thinks it necessary to lie, steal and kill."

"For one individual to kill another we recognize as violence, but not always do we recognize that to starve people through low wages is just as violent. For one man to burn another man's home we recognize as wrong, but not always do we recognize that to keep a man living in the slums is just as wrong."

In short, we recognize overt violence, but not covert violence," she declared that preparations are being made in England for "war greater than ever before," she admonished the Christian Church to work for a program which would establish this country's defense policy, not on the basis of a race with other nations in armament building, but on the principles of humanity and brotherhood taught by Christ.

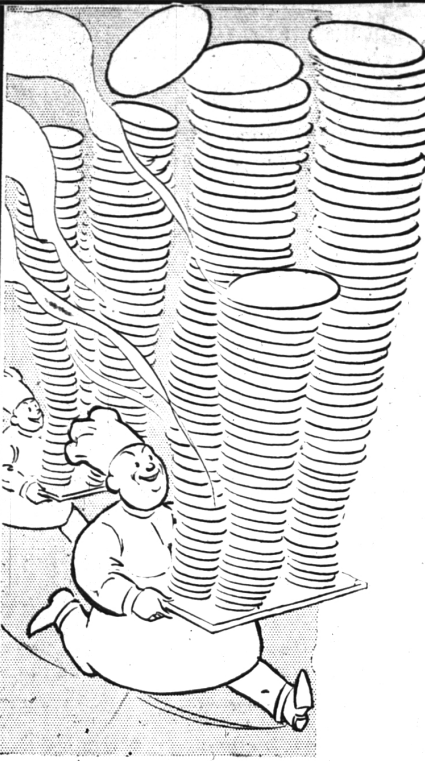
