HELLEN GRAWN KEEPS CROWN

Detroit Girl Wins Kingswood Net Tourney 3rd Year In Row

Lossing only six games in the entire tournament, Helen Grawn, of Detroit, former national girls' indoor tennis champion, won the state girls' singles crown for the third straight year in the annual tournament held at Kingswood School, Cranbrook, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

In the final round Sunday afternoon, Miss Grawn, a student of Liggett School, Detroit, defeated Merida Hobart, of Ann Arbor, daughter of a University of Michigan professor, with the same ease with which she had eliminated all her previous opponents. The scores were 6-1, 6-1.

Both of the games lost by Miss Grawn were on her own service. She is changing her style of service this season and was guilty of six double faults in her match against Miss Hobart. Otherwise, her game was characterized by the same steady consistency, accuracy and power which has brought her close to the top in the net game at the age of 17.

To Enter Senior Competition
Miss Grawn's last appearance in the Kingswood tourney, since her age next season will eliminate her from further girls' competition and bring her into the senior class.

In the semi-finals, played Sunday morning, Miss Grawn defeated Mary Burleson, city junior girls champion of Flint, 6-0, 6-0, and Miss Hobart eliminated Jane Kavanaugh, of Detroit Southeastern High, 2-6, 6-3, 8-6.

Earl round victims of Miss Grawn's skill and strategy had been Dolores Wilson, Dearborn High, whom she defeated by default; Patricia Floyd, Kingswood School, who fell by scores of 6-2, 6-0, and Margorie Gillen, of Ann Arbor, who gave the Detroit her best match of the tourney, though losing by the lopsided count of 6-0, 6-2.

Previous to the semi-finals, Miss Hobart had defeated Mary Bodwick, Detroit Denby High, 6-3, 6-0; Kathleen Belknap, Kingswood School, 6-0, 6-1 and Martha Welch, Kingswood, leading player, 6-4, 6-1. Miss Hobart will also be unable to compete next year because of her age.

25 Entries
Twenty-five girls in all were entered in the tournament, which was directed by Miss Louella Houser, physical education instructor at Kingswood.

James Talman won the junior singles crown in the Bloomfield Center tournament, final of which were also held at Kingswood Sunday. He defeated Jack Judson in the title round, 7-5, 6-0, 7-5. Talman's brother, Tom Talman, advanced to the finals in the boys' singles division, but there lost to Hamilton White, 7-5, 2-6, 6-1.

James Talman and Judson defeated Robert Hackett and Robert Hargreaves for the junior doubles crown, 6-0, 6-2.
